

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Gadding About by Reverend Jan Taddeo

Our ministry theme for August is Paradox and Ambiguity. These are concepts many struggle with. It seems that many (most?) people really appreciate either/or and concrete answers to very complex situations -to find a way to simplify the complexity of relationships and people. Often people want to label others as good or bad, and yet, as Bryan Stevenson reminds us, we are each more than the worst thing we've done. It is too simplistic to label any person as good or bad - we all have the capacity to cause harm and to do good works.

Ambiguity is present in our work for justice. As white people learn more about how injustice and inequity affect the lives of the majority of people on this planet, and see how certain populations are treated as if their lives do not matter, the work to dismantle these systems can feel threatening to our own sense of what it means to be a good person. We can choose to be divided by our different perspectives, or we can choose to be in deep dialogue to hear one another's truths. And, vet, people's lives are at stake and choices have to be made to respond to the calls for justice. We are not a faith that just talks about justice and equity... we are called to be in the community creating justice and equity in partnership with others.

Ambiguity and paradox can also be part of one's search for truth and meaning. People who come into Unitarian Universalism as adults have often rejected the religious tradition in which they grew up or where they spent many of their adult years. Maybe a religious leader did something bad that harmed people and this provoked a choice to abandon that faith completely. Maybe that faith lacked ambiguity and only offered concrete answers to complex questions. And, maybe there was something in that faith that was worth keeping. When I ask newcomers what was good about their previous faith communities almost always it was about the people -- the community that companioned

each other through life's ups and downs.

As we embark on another year together creating that kind of companioning for each other, I invite you to seek ways to connect through the many programs we'll be offering this year to move us towards our vision. In addition to Covenant Groups, we'll offer regular sessions for Starting Point, a small group program open to newcomers and seasoned members to learn more about Unitarian Universalism and UUCG.



Bob Patrick and Barbara Stahnke will be offering an updated version of their Working on Whiteness small group program. We'll also offer more opportunities for people to engage with the Transgender Inclusion in Congregations program. Through our Green Space Lay Ministry we'll be offering "Our Place in the Web of Life" to deepen our understanding of place, to explore how our behaviors as a congregation and as individuals affect people, communities, and the ecosystem, and discover ways we can promote environmental justice in our local community. It will be an enriching year!

The Green Team has, with support from Georgia Interfaith Power & Light and Turning Sun, selected and purchased a sanitizing dishwasher. Working on Whiteness

Four years ago, UUCG offered a listening group called "Working on Whiteness." We invited people in the congregation who identify as white to gather in the spirit of our congregational covenant. With practices of deep listening we spent twelve 2-hour sessions across a 10 month period investigating and reflecting on the effects of white privilege in our culture. We identified the ways that we personally benefit from the effects of systemic white supremacist systems. We supported each other as we faced the discomfort this creates.

We are planning our second offering of that group for 2021-2022. White supremacy as a collective and historical energy still runs the systems of our national culture, politics, economics, education, healthcare and the various infrastructures that we depend on each day. Since our last offering, our national politics has exploded into open examples of white nationalist attempts to stop and silence conversations about racism in the US. That's the slogan for the Human Library, a 10year-old organization, started in Copenhagen and coming to Gwinnett this fall. UUCG and the Five Forks branch of Gwinnett County Public Library are partnering to bring this innovative program that celebrates diversity in all its guises.



On Saturday, October 9, Gwinnett residents will be able to "check out" human "books" for a conversation, books with titles like "Transgender," "Living with Mental Illness," "Muslim," "Blind." We are in the recruiting process for volunteers with unique life experiences, who are willing to share their stories. "Books" undergo a training program, which helps to create a safe space.

So what does that mean for you? First of all, come. Details will be forthcoming. It promises to be a meaningful event, providing insight into the lives of people who are different from you. Secondly, we need volunteers. Each book will have a "handler," who will help manage their interviewees, plus we need folks to help with registration. Sound interesting? Give Away the Plate



Book Group: Born A Crime by Trevor Noah

Trevor Noah's unlikely path from apartheid South Africa to the desk of The Daily Show began with a criminal act: his birth. Trevor was born to a white Swiss father and a black Xhosa mother at a time when such a union was punishable by five years in prison. Living proof of his parents' indiscretion, Trevor was kept mostly indoors for the earliest years of his life, bound by the extreme and often absurd measures his mother took to hide him from a government that could, at any moment, steal him away. Finally liberated by the end of South Africa's tyrannical white rule, Trevor and his mother set forth on a grand adventure, living openly and freely and embracing the opportunities won by a centuries-long struggle.



Born a Crime is the story of a mischievous young boy who grows into a restless young man as he struggles to find himself in a world where he was never supposed to exist. It is

also the story of that young man's relationship with his fearless, rebellious, and fervently religious mother—his teammate, a woman determined to save her son from the cycle of poverty, violence, and abuse that would ultimately threaten her own life.

The stories collected here are by turns hilarious, dramatic, and deeply affecting. Whether subsisting on caterpillars for dinner during hard times, being thrown from a moving car during an attempted kidnapping, or just trying to survive the life-and-death pitfalls of dating in high school, Trevor illuminates his curious world with an incisive wit and unflinching honesty. His stories weave together to form a moving and searingly funny portrait of a boy making his way through a damaged world in a dangerous time, armed only with a keen sense of humor and a mother's unconventional, unconditional love.

From the Endowment Fund

The Endowment Fund ran a very successful \$40 for 40 campaign in early 2021 gaining \$3500 from 79 donors. Due to a very positive return on investments for 2019 & 2020 we were able to make a grant of \$3000 to UUCG to purchase new equipment to continue streaming services even after we return to in-person gathering.

As of the end of July, the assets of the Fund totaled \$88,069.04 made up as follows:

> UUA Common Endowment Fund \$64,593.67 BB&T Bank savings & checking 5,523.61 Coca Cola Stock (drip acct) 203.56 UUCG Sewer Loan balance 17,745.20

The asset value is variable based on investment performance. We continue to encourage UUCG members to make Birthday Club donations as our primary growth mechanism.

From the UUCG Board of Trustees

August is an exciting month at UUCG, as we return to in-person worship and begin our transition to normalcy (knock on wood, right?). While the past year has been a trying one, I wanted to bring to your attention a project that we've been working on for the past several months and that was adopted at the July board meeting. We've rewritten the UUCG Policy Manual. Wait! Stop! Don't move on to the next article. It's important. Really, it is.

Over the past several years, UUCG has been moving toward "policybased governance," as outlined in the book Governance and Ministry by Dan Hotchkiss. Basically, this is a model for running the business of the congregation that ensures consistency. Throughout the year, numerous questions arise concerning staffing, banking, who reports to whom... Rather than discuss each instance as it occurs, we now have a "rule book" that we can turn to for clear guidance in any given situation. We've had policy manuals in the past and we offer many thanks to those who have contributed to the creation of those. But any organization changes and adapts over time, and so must its policies.

The process began with a task force last fall, consisting of Toby Lyles, Carol Pinto, Chuck Powell, and Maryjane Stout. As Board Secretary, Maryjane then proceeded from those initial discussions and worked with the UUCG Board of Trustees to reflect on various policies and to update their status. After the manual was written, she submitted the document to Alex Kapitan of the Unitarian Universalist Association in Boston for sensitivity to inclusive language and policies, as well as for practical edits. Maryjane put in countless hours of work on this document. Please offer her your thanks when you see her.
