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Opening to Joy

Capture at least one image of joy every day for a week!

If you don't have a camera, you could instead keep a notebook (a "joy journal") with you and write down what the image is, describing it in enough detail that it will pull you back to the joy you experienced when you read it later.



When the week is over, take some time to reflect on the images you've captured. Is there a common thread? What do the images say about your experience of delight?

Is color key? Surprise? Silliness? Beauty? People? Nature?

And after reflecting, consider taking it further by doing something creative with your images and insights. For instance, turn your pictures into a slideshow with music behind it. Or maybe do a final entry in your notebook/" joy journal" that sums up your insights. Or maybe write a thank letter or love letter to your images/experiences of joy. Some may want to create a collage. Others may want to print out a picture or two and frame them for a wall in your home.

Gadding About Sabbatical Update by Reverend Jan Taddeo



I began this sabbatical time with a solo spiritual retreat in Jacksonville Beach, Florida where I rented a small "beach bungalow" for two weeks. While there, I began a new daily prayer practice, meditated several times a day, did Qi Gong, walked on the beach for 2 or 3 hours a day, and engaged in some creative practices. I even woke up at 5:30 one morning so I could watch the first light emerge and the sun rise. It was worth the effort!

In the November GNUUS, I promised I would share my reading list:

Vimalakirti and the Awakened Heart: A Commentary on The Sutra That Vimalakirti Speaks,

Joan Sutherland Roshi. This is a timeless meditation on developing a peaceful and generous heart in a world of sorrows, and on how the awakening of each of us is an inextricable part of the awakening of the world.

Simplicity: The Freedom of Letting Go, Richard Rohr. Simplicity explores St. Francis's ancient call to the simple life, where joy, not dry theology, helps us build relationships and find peace in ourselves.

Widening the Circle of Concern: Report of the UUA Commission on Institutional Change I've read most of the chapters for various workshops and programs I've been involved with, and will read it in full during my time away.

Me and White Supremacy: Combat Racism, Change the World, and Become a Good Ancestor, Layla F. Saad and the official companion book, A Guided Journal. Structured as a 28-day guide targeted at white readers, the book aims to aid readers in identifying the impact of white privilege and white supremacy over their lives.

Defund Fear: Safety Without Policing, Prisons and Punishment, Zach Norris. This is the UUA Common Read for 2022. I plan to lead a discussion on this book at SUUSI in July 2022, and hopefully a discussion will be offered at UUCG as well.

White Supremacy Culture: Still Here, Tema Okun, May 2021 (an updated version of the original article written in 1999)

The Time is Now: A Call to Uncommon Courage, Joan Chittister. Benedictine nun and activist Chittister offers a pulpit-thumping call to assume a stance and voice of prophetic spirituality to resist oppression and injustice.

My Grandmother's Hands: Racialized Trauma and the Pathway to Mending Our Hearts and Bodies, Resmaa Menakem. The consequences of racism can be found in our bodies - in skin and sinew, in bone and blood. Therapist Resmaa Menakem examines the damage, the physical consequences of discrimination, from the perspective of body-centered psychology.

Deep Adaptation: A Map for Navigating Climate Tragedy, IFLAS Occasional Paper 2, Professor Jem Bendell BA (Hons) PhD, Revised 2nd Edition released July 27, 2020

Dinosaur Dreaming: Our Climate Moment, Gail Collins-Ranadive. The author describes our global threat with clarity, calm and efficiency. She moves on to explore the various forms of our response, political, public, personal.

Immoderate Greatness: Why Civilizations Fail, William Ophuls explains how a civilization's very magnitude conspires against it to cause downfall. Civilizations are hard-wired for self-destruction.

Salsa, Soul, and Spirit: Leadership for a Multicultural Age; New Approaches to Leadership from Latino, Black and American Indian Communities, Juana Bordas. This book has been on my reading stack for several years, and I am looking forward to finishing it as our congregation continues to deepen our journey in being a radically welcoming sanctuary.

I miss you all dearly, hold you all on my heart and in my prayers, and I am so very grateful for this precious time to rest and renew. Please take good care of each other.

2022 Budget

From the Board

Budget time! And we need your input. During our town hall meeting, there was some question about our donation to the national Unitarian Universalist Association. I promised we would have further discussion before the budget vote on December 12. After consideration, I think the best time to draw the maximum number of people to this conversation is to hold it just before the vote. And so...we will hold discussion on the budget (all aspects of the budget) immediately following service on the 12th, and then we will vote.

A few things to note.

* There are changes afoot at the UUA. There is an effort underway to update the organizational bylaws, including our seven principles. This is a healthy thing for any organization to do periodically (we are updating the UUCG bylaws as we speak). The UUCG board has been planning for a while now to hold a congregational conversation about these changes sometime in late January. Congregations across the country will discuss these at General Assembly this summer. There will be further discussion throughout next year, and then there will be a vote at GA in 2023. Please know we will have plenty of discussion around this topic, but probably not before the budget vote.

* The UUA is the national organization for all Unitarian Universalist congregations. As in any denomination, the national organization provides curriculum, training, support, and guidance for member congregations. To divorce ourselves from the UUA is to cease to be UU. I appreciated very much the comments of Terry Welsher at our town hall meeting. He pointed out that there is a difference between supporting the concept of belonging to a national organization and supporting every decision that organization makes. When we disagree, we voice our opinion, but remain members.

* I recognize that no one suggested we not remain members. The issue concerns giving money to the UUA when we're struggling to cover our own ministry. When the slides were presented, we included the current year's budget for comparison to the upcoming year's budget. When you compare our budgeted contribution to UUA from 2021 to 2022, it appears as if there is a huge increase. What those numbers did NOT show was that the request for 2021 was \$10,918. We budgeted for less (\$9000) but have been able to meet the full request. In 2020, the request was \$11,265, which we met. We have met the requested donation amount every one of our 40 years except for three. In 2022, the ask is for \$11,950. These numbers are calculated annually, based on the overall expenses of the congregation and the number of members. I promised to contact the UUA to see if they will reconsider our dues. I have reached out but have not heard back yet, most likely because of the holidays. I expect to have this answer before the budget vote.

* In the meantime, the biggest need of our congregation is for you to turn in your pledge for next year. Not everyone can give top dollar, but everyone can give something, and that something will help. No one enjoys talking/ hearing about pledging, but it allows us to create a meaningful plan for the coming year.

Some people voiced the opinion that they aren't being heard. As your board president, I feel strongly that all voices be heard. Please feel free to contact me with any issues or attend a board meeting on the third Tuesday of each month. (It helps if you let us know you plan to speak at a board meeting, so that we can include it in our agenda).

I know I am thankful for UUCG and for all the moving parts that make it work.

How We Will Gather:

Guidelines for Reconvening

We are overjoyed to welcome the congregation back into our shared space for Sunday Morning Worship services again beginning on Sunday, December 5th! Below you will find the answers to some Frequently Asked Questions about the guidelines for regathering. These guidelines have been carefully considered, with our shared values of safety, inclusivity, and community at the center.

Can I just show up at the church on Sunday Morning?

Well, you can, but we strongly encourage you to register your intent to attend in person. Seating is limited due to safe gathering guidelines, and it really helps us to know in advance how many people to expect.

Will I have to wear a mask?

Yes, everyone above the age of 2 who enters the building will be required to be masked. The only exception may be Service Leaders who may opt to remove their masks when they speak from the pulpit. We will have disposable masks available at the front door for anyone who arrives without one.

Can I sit wherever I want in the Sanctuary?

The beacons will be acting as ushers, and will show you to a seat when you arrive, based on availability and on (as best they can) whatever preferences you express regarding where you'd like to sit.

I'm looking forward to hugging all my friends... can I do that?

Some people may not be comfortable with that just yet. As always, hugging and other forms of touch should be consensual – ask first!

What about singing?

The Choir will be singing, wearing masks and with separated seating. The congregation will not be singing at this time.

What about coffee???

You are invited to bring your own coffee (or other preferred soft beverage), but none will be prepared or served on-site. The kitchen is closed for food prep and service for the time being. One person at a time may utilize the sink for hand washing and access to water.

The water fountain in the hall is also closed, and there will be no potluck dining until further notice. **Will there be Faith Development?**

Yes! Adult Faith Development will resume on-site on December 5th. We will be convening on-site at 10:00am, as before. These sessions will also be accessible via Zoom for anyone wishing to participate from home.

Will childcare be available?

Not at present. We are inviting all families to sit together in the sanctuary during the worship service. Space will be provided in the Nursery rooms for parents who need a quiet moment with their child(ren), but there will be no childcare provider on duty.

Parents/caregivers are required to remain with their children at all times while in the building or on the grounds.

What about Children's RE?

In-person RE will not be convening in groups. There will be a "lesson" and activities available every week beginning in December that families who come in person may wish to engage in together while they are here, or take home with them. This same session plan will be provided via weekly email to families who opt to stay at home. If you would like physical materials sent to your home, please make sure you are registered for Faith Development, and reach out to Christiana to request a weekly packet.

What about the playground?

Children may use the playground, wearing masks and mindful of safe distancing. There must be two adults present anytime children are on the playground.

What if my family and I are not ready to come back yet in person?

Sunday morning Worship Services and many other UUCG events will remain accessible via Zoom. We look forward to welcoming you back to the building when you are comfortable returning. In the meantime, please continue to participate in congregational life online.



SUMMARY: In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world, known for her impeccable taste and shrewd negotiating for critical works as she helps create a world-class collection.

But Belle has a secret, one she must protect at all costs. She was born not Belle da Costa Greene but Belle Marion Greener. She is the daughter of Richard Greener, the first Black graduate of Harvard and a well-known advocate for equality. Belle's complexion isn't dark because of her alleged Portuguese heritage that lets her pass as white—her complexion is dark because she is African American.

The Personal Librarian tells the story of an extraordinary woman, famous for her intellect, style, and wit, and shares the lengths she must go to—for the protection of her family and her legacy—to preserve her carefully crafted white identity in the racist world in which she lives.
