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
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
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








#### The Path of Wonder

## **Gadding About**

Our Unitarian Universalist faith invites us on an everchanging, ever-evolving spiritual journey. We have core values that guide us and

covenants that keep us on the path together. The core values of Unitarianism, Universalism, and Unitarian Universalism and the covenants we hold with one another have been evolving and changing since our earliest covenant, the Cambridge Platform, in 1648.

The most recent form of our values and promises were adopted in 1985, known to many of us as our Seven Principles and Six Sources. These can and should continue to inspire us, even as we explore new language to articulate the evolution of our understanding of who we are and the promises we need to make at this time to move us closer to creating models of the Beloved Community within and among our congregations, and in the wider world.

Please take time to review and engage with the process and conversations about our core values as stated in Article II of the Bylaws of the Unitarian Universalist Association. You can learn and explore about this great endeavor at this link: www.uua.org/a2sc. And please be sure to join us for worship, especially on January 8 as we explore this effort during and after the service.

I am personally enthusiastic about this turning point in our evolving faith. The proposed draft language for our values and covenant is centered on Love ... a Love that knows no bounds, a love that connects us, guides us, and compels us to actions that affirm the human dignity and worth. The values that we articulate in this draft covenant are Justice, Equity, Evolution, Pluralism, Generosity, and Interdependence. There is explicit covenant language for each of these values stating the promises we make with other member congregations to live into these values.

In December we explore the path of Wonder-wondering about answers to big questions, wondering about the state of the world and our part in it, wondering about miracles, grief, joy, birth, death, and the many rituals and traditions that mark our wonderings. In January, we explore the path of Finding our Center - perhaps the center of our personal lives, the center of our congregational life, the center of our faith tradition, the center we hold in this moment.

I go into this winter season wondering about the state of the world and my, and our, and Unitarian Universalism's capacity to grow, evolve, and shape ourselves to meet the needs of our time. We know that great changes are already taking place - climate change, financial challenges, wealth disparity, political division, and so much more. Who do we need to become and how do we need to be during the tumultuous times ahead? Who do we need to partner with? What resources do we have to offer, and what resources will we need? Who do we need to be and what core values will guide us? There are many questions for us to explore together, and the possibilities for rich conversations are abundant.

## **Covid Guidelines Update**

To borrow a line from the ancient Greek philosopher Heraclitus, the only constant in life is change. This has been especially true over the last few years as we have seen COVID -19 variants come and go, the development of different treatments and vaccines, and the evolution of recommendations to correspond with those changes. UUCG's policies are also evolving in response to our latest stage of the pandemic. This column describes those changes, along with giving a brief description of our reason for each change. Anyone who wants a fuller discussion of the reasons behind the changes is welcome to send an email to president@uucg.org. I would be happy to oblige.

Over the summer the Board authorized the reintroduction of the intention table. This was driven by the copious amount of research available at this point, which shows that the vast majority of COVID-19 transmission is due to breathing shared air, rather than through shared items. Accordingly, use of the intention table does not significantly increase risk to the congregation.

The Board approved re-opening the nursery during services and guidelines for in-person faith development for young children. Reverend Jan is currently working to ensure we have staff and volunteers for that, and soon we hope to announce that the nursery is ready to re-open. The availability of COVID-19 vaccines for children as young as six months was the primary driver in this decision.

The Board authorized the resumption of potluck meals. Eating in a large group is an inherently risky activity, and incredibly valuable for promoting our shared community. Accordingly, during periods of relatively low risk and with safeguards in place, we want to allow the option for the congregation to eat in a communal setting. This decision was guided by too many sources to list them all. To mention just a couple, the CDC masking guidelines and the fact that we have now seen almost two months of "low" risk were important to this decision.

Each of the recent changes has added options that individuals may take advantage of or not based on their own preferences and risk tolerance. The Board has also discussed the possibility of changing our masking policies for services, but we recognize that this would be a step of a fundamentally different nature. Accordingly, in the coming weeks we will seek guidance from the congregation on how to balance the risks and benefits of differing masking policies. Our goal is to be as inclusive as possible, being aware that our congregation includes both people with risk factors that make COVID -19 extraordinarily dangerous and others who feel that wearing a mask interferes with their ability to take part fully in the congregation. ### The Wonder of the Season

Tis the season for Wonder! The Yule season, the Season of Cheer and Good Tidings.

It's beautiful to see the wondrous look on a child's face this time of year. The lights that twinkle at night are dazzling and the smile of a child peering at the bright colorful dancing lights is so beautiful. The magic they see this time of year is truly wondrous.

As I grow older I try so hard to regain that innocent childlike wonder around these days. While growing up there were two holidays that my family just loved, Halloween and Christmas. I didn't love Christmas just for the presents, I also love it for the family I would see. Looking back, I have fonder memories seeing my cousins and family rather than the gifts I received. My Aunt Grace would always task us with discovering traditions celebrated all over the world at the Yule Time. And during our family gathering we would talk about what we had discovered. We celebrated Christmas with the traditions of the Irish, Germans, Italians, French, and Hungarian from what I can remember. My cousins and I would create a play or sing songs to entertain our family. The food would be from the various cultures we had studied through the year. It was our own family tradition. Living with my mother I would be carted from one family member's house to the other as we celebrated with so many different family members.

When I moved in with my father the traditions were all very different. The week of Christmas we would spend making tamales and chili and enjoy the fruits of our labor for dinner on Christmas Eve. Christmas eve night I could open one gift under the tree and we would have a fire in the fireplace and my Step mother and I would spend a good portion of the day preparing for Christmas day. On Christmas Day we would pack all the food up and drive to my Grandfather's house and have dinner with him, my cousins, Uncle and Aunt. It was a small gathering of family, very different from my mothers family.

These two different traditions are now part of my life. The discovery of how other cultures celebrate and honor this time of year is so magical for me. In addition to these I have added a few of my own in honor of my Pagan path. Several of us have some beautiful traditions that we've shared with others, here are mine and a few that were shared with me.

#### **Mother's Night**

Mothers night is an evening I celebrate to honor my ancestral mothers, without them I would not be here. I set up an altar with photos of the women in my family tree. I write a letter to my Mother, Grandmothers and Aunt that I knew. I offer them drinks and food that I know they liked and light candles with their presence. I do this in solidarity as it's a very personal ritual for me. I read about this Norse tradition in 2011, when I became pagan, and I have practiced it since.

#### Deck the Halls, Decorations & Yule Logs!

Decking the halls with evergreens and yule logs (although smaller now) traditions have been around for centuries, and in multiple cultures. Although the size of the ever green and the yule log has now flipped the symbolism is still there. Evergreens symbolize life, rebirth and renewal, it was a much smaller evergreen that was brought in to decorate the home, but the green encouraged people to get through the winter. The yule log, originating in Scandinavia, was a felled Ash or Oak tree and brought in to provide fire for the next year. A piece of the yule log was put aside to burn with next year's log.

Sharon Yun makes wreath making a tradition in her home, as she has also done wreath making classes in the past.

Pam Neis' family has been celebrating Yule the same for 40+ years now, and in her ritual she includes decorating and a Yule log;

"It starts with appetizers; then the ritual which includes the adults lighting a candle to represent their hopes for the coming year from the Yule log; the children make a wish as they decorate the tree with an ornament with their name; then the battle between the oak and holly kings. After the ritual I give out my presents and then we feast on prime rib."



#### **Restorative Justice**

"Restorative justice focuses on relationships, the need for repair when relationships are broken or violated, and the question of who within the community is responsible for meeting "the obligations and needs that are created through violation" (148). Mariame Kabe

As I write this, I want you to know that I am not an expert; I am not a parent of student in the Gwinnett County Schools; I am not a teacher or leader in the Gwinnett County Schools. I do write this because I am concerned that the media hype is suggesting a return to a vigorous punishment model. The prior policies led to disproportionate impacts on students of color, especially black students, in the Gwinnett County Schools. Gwinnett County had a higher number of black students being sent to alternative schools than the combined total of black students in the other metro Atlanta School Districts.

The Gwinnett County School leadership is working to transition to a Restorative Justice framework; this transition has been called into question due to recent events of violence. Teachers, parents, students, journalists, community leaders and the community in general have been called into and out of the conversation around this change.

[Their] mission is to educate, advocate and secure the protection and stewardship of the Chattahoochee River, including its lakes, tributaries and watershed, in order to restore and conserve their ecological health for the people and wildlife that depend on the river system and in recognition of the important ecosystem functions provided throughout the region and planet.

Restorative Justice moves away from traditional punishment models in seeking justice within the community. The implementation of this model within the Behavioral Policies (the whole policy can be found <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>) in the Gwinnett County Schools is part of a process to aid by trying new models. The leaders are hoping that the disproportionate impacts can be addressed by considering the complexity involved in relationships within a diverse student-teacher-community body. Student misbehavior should not lead to punishment but to accountability and healing broken relationships. Sometimes the broken relationships are in the community itself. I believe we must start somewhere. This is a step, and the processes must be allowed time to work – not fall back to older models that caused disproportionate harms. As Gwinnett Community Members here at UUCG, I hope you will read, listen and learn about Restorative Justice and also Transformative Justice.
