

Message From the Minister



Returning to OUR Love by Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones (she/her)

On Friday evening, July 18, UUCG's board members, lay ministers, Christiana Fernandez-McQuain, and I gathered in a circle in the sanctuary (in person and online) to begin the Annual Leader Retreat for 2025-2026. These Leader Retreats have three primary goals:



- 1. To develop deeper relationships among the leaders and staff so that mutual love and understanding will guide our work together
- 2. To name an Annual Vision of Ministry—an overarching theme around which UUCG will focus our learning, being, and doing in the coming program year
- 3. To discern the Shared Congregational Goals, the main areas in which we want to grow

This year the retreat began with each of us choosing, from random images, the one that most resonated with us. We shared what the image was and why it resonated—and then we go deeper: What does this resonance say about

our spirits, our essence, our connections to what is deepest in us and to what is larger than us?

The stories are tender and intimate, sorrowful, searching, and funny. There's such generosity in the sharing, and so much diversity. The process reminds us of our "why"—why we are here together, as part of UUCG, and why we each may be here on this planet, too. Pause for a moment, dear ones: What is your "why"?

Then Christiana and I introduced these questions:

- What is the **core teaching** of this congregation?
- What is the **central ministry** of this congregation?
- In other words, what is the **unique identity** of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett our unique expression of this Unitarian Universalist faith? What is our purpose? Why does UUCG exist?

We leaders won't try to answer these questions on our own; they belong to the whole congregation. For the retreat, we can let these questions seed our work toward defining the Annual Vision of Ministry and the Shared Goals. We also drew on the responses to this year's Congregational Survey (see the summary in this issue), and we added in our own experiences, wisdom, intuition, and love for UUCG. We stirred all of this together, and with much thought and discussion, some straying from the topic at hand, a few breaks for food, and a lot of laughter, we came up with these guides for UUCG for the year that begins this month:

Who Participated?

- More classes on practical skills and knowledge sharing, plus OWL
- More variety of times for classes
- More Trans Inclusion and other opportunities to grow in this area
- More updated songs in worship
- · More meditation and mindfulness practice, in worship and beyond
- · More variety of speakers on Sunday mornings, including guests from other religions and organizations
- More visibility for Board members, and more Board updates on financial and building news
- More accessibility to and use of our outdoor spaces
- More visibility for Green Team
- And many more specific requests, all of which the leaders and staff have absorbed

Seeking More Pastoral Care Associates!

UUCG's Pastoral Care Associates play a crucial role in creating and sustaining our congregation's Culture of Care. They are partners with me, as your minister, in companioning our folx in times of need. Pastoral Care Associates (PCAs) can testify to the satisfaction they get from offering their love in this way.

It's time now to expand the team!

I envision a team of 6 to 10 Pastoral Care Associates, each of whom takes on one or more of the following roles. Pastoral Care Associates rotate their duties. With a robust team, a PCA would likely serve in one of these roles just one week out of each month or more.

Training in all these roles will be offered in the fall and open to all who are interested in growing our capacity for compassionate companionship.

Members of Covenant Groups are especially encouraged to attend.

All titles here are tentative; this vision is still emerging!

- **Listener**: Responds to calls on UUCG's Pastoral Care line during the week that the PA is on call
- **Connector**: Makes phone calls or sends Cards from the Heart to congregants on our care radar to see how they are doing
- **Visitor**: Visits congregants in hospitals, homes, or coffee shops to offer occasional in-person companionship
- Sunday Pastoral Carer: Holds a space on Sundays after worship where people can light a candle, fill out a prayer/care request, speak with a compassionate listener

The New Roof is Coming! by Dan Kelly, President, UUCG Board of Trustees

We have been given a tentative START DATE for Construction of August 19th. The project is anticipated to take five working days. It is important to keep in mind that, like any construction project, the exact dates can shift because of weather or other delays.

Therefore, we are assuming the building will be unavailable from August 18-August 30.

We intend to have Worship Service in the Sanctuary on August 17 and August 31. We will need lots of help to prepare the Sanctuary after August 17 Service and reset it before August 31 Service!

Discussions are in the works with Worship Leaders to develop an alternative location or plan for the August 24 Service.

Should the Start Date for Construction change by a week or more, we will adjust the "window" accordingly and communicate information as we receive it.

We will need to continue preparing the building each weekend. We made a great start, but there's lots more to do! We are hoping that someone in Leadership can step forward for each Saturday to be the coordinator. Please let me and Christiana know if you are able to serve as a coordinator on any Saturday.

A Challenging Chore

As part of UUCG's mission to be a sanctuary in a green space we have committed to several sustainable practices, one of which is to reduce our waste. Rather than filling our trash with disposables, we use ceramic mugs, glass plates and silverware, when possible. We separate our paper, plastic, and aluminum from non-recyclables to be properly disposed of and hopefully remade into new products. We also collect compostable food items in a container so that they don't rot away in a landfill.

Everyone who uses the church facilities has a hand in this process. After service, those that use a mug are reminded to take care of cleaning and putting it away, just as volunteers are tasked with washing the many used dishes and utensils following potluck. Trash and recycling bins are routinely taken out of the building by the Facilities Caretaker to be picked up by city waste management crews. So, what about the food scraps? Who is in charge of those? Well, the answer to that is no one and everyone. Our compost bin is in great need of equal attendance from congregants so that we can keep the kitchen sanitary and the soil fed.

As a weekly errand, before the container becomes overfull and attracts pests, the compost bucket should be emptied and cleaned by any willing and able person. To do this one must:

1. Lift the lidded bucket out of the wooden cabinet and take it out the front doors, up the grassy hill, and over to the raised garden beds.



2. Remove the lid and dump the contents of the bucket into the black compost tumbler, after which a few good turns should be given. If the tumbler is already too full of material then the bucket can be emptied into the center well space of the Keyhole Garden.



3. Bring the bucket and lid to the portico where the water hose is coiled to rinse them off completely. The spigot must be turned on and off from the inside, found in a small recess in the wall to the left of the doors, as well as the outside.



4. Return to the kitchen where an additional wipe down with soap will need to be done to remove any lingering smell before the bucket can be put back in its place, ready to receive another round of organic waste.




Next Property Beautification Day: August 2





Meeting the Monent Film Screening: Journalists Under Fire

UUCG will host a screening of the documentary film "Gaza: Journalists Under Fire," directed by Robert Greenwald and produced by Brave New Films, with follow-up discussion

Sunday, August 31st, 12:30pm-2:00pm at UUCG Facilitated by Steve Babb & Barbara Stahnke



As of April 2025, 178 journalists and media workers have been killed in Gaza since October 7th, 2023 – more than the total number of journalists killed in the U.S. Civil War, World War One, World War Two, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, and the War in Afghanistan combined.

Another 93 journalists have been wounded over that period, with an additional 84 journalists being arrested or detained, and 70 press facilities in Gaza being destroyed.

Most of these reporters have been killed while clearly displaying passes identifying them as members of the press. Many of them have been killed in their homes together with their families in targeted airstrikes. Israel bars foreign reporters, fact-finding missions, and human rights groups from entering Gaza, with the exception of a few tightly controlled and curated tours for selected reporters embedded with Israeli military forces. This makes Palestinian reporters living and working in Gaza the only independent source of information on what is happening in Gaza other than the Israeli military and government.

This documentary focuses specifically on the story of three of the most prominent Gaza journalists who have been killed since October 7th, including:

Bilal Jadallah, the Director of Press House-Palestine, who was killed on November 19th, 2023 at the age of 45, making him the 49th journalist killed in this conflict;

Heba Al-Abdallah, a radio host, journalist, and co-founder of Social Media Club-Palestine who was killed together with her daughter, her mother, and several other family members on January 9th, 2024 at the age of 30, making her the 84th journalist killed in this conflict; and Ismail al-Ghoul, Al Jazeera journalist and reporter, who was killed on July 31st, 2024 at the age of 27, making him the 126th journalist killed in this conflict.

We will watch this 40-minute documentary together and then have a brief discussion about it. *Please note that this documentary contains some graphic and disturbing images that are not suitable for young children*.

Covenant Groups are returning this September. We are still in the planning phase, but I would







Connection, Memory, and a New Life

As summer winds down and many in our community return from vacations and travel, I've found myself becoming steady—present through the quiet weeks, tending to both ministry and the deep inner work of becoming a parent. While others return, I have been reminded of something timeless: love.

For me, this season has been less about going away and more about going inward. I'm 14 weeks pregnant now, and with each passing week, I find myself reflecting on where I've come from—what has shaped me, who has guided me, and what I want to pass on (mainly thanks to my therapist). At the center of these reflections has continuously been my grandmother, Min—short for Minny.

Growing up, I spent most of my summer with her and Papa. Min wasn't just my grandmother; she was my mentor and guide. Her presence lives in some of my most cherished memories. What I remember most vividly is her spiritual practice and how it created space for her community. Min was part of a vibrant Buddhist community and I often watched her host Gongyo at her home. At the time, I didn't fully understand the meaning behind the chants or the sacred gathering till I got older, but I always knew it was special.

After Gongyo, there would be food and conversations that opened windows to a world much larger than my own. Culture, identity, faith, resilience, all around her kitchen table and den. I realize now how much those moments influenced my values and my openness to others. It wasn't until later in life that I began to engage in Gongyo myself, but those early impressions had already taken root.

Now, preparing for the next chapter of my life as a parent, I feel called to return to the love I first experienced with Min. Not just her love for me,

but the love she shared with her community, her spiritual devotion, and her belief in connection across differences. That legacy is one I want to share with our child. Tim and I are already imagining what it means to raise someone with curiosity about people, places, cultures, and practices—to cultivate not just kindness, but a genuine openness to the beauty of the world.



As our UUCG community reconnects and returns to shared rhythms after summer's quietness, I find myself holding space for both continuity and change. I haven't stepped away, but I have been transforming. Steeped in memory, grounded in spiritual practice, and preparing for the sacred unknown ahead, I am returning too—not from a trip, but to love itself. The kind of love Min taught me. The kind that expands across generations and cultures. The kind that connects us beyond the surface and deep into the heart of who we are. This is my practice now. Returning to love—for me, for our baby, and for our family.

"Small Wins Do Not Balance the Equation"

Sparked by UUCG's Good Trouble, Climate Justice Revival, and Green Sanctuary ministries coming together and identifying a place of collective power, we have partnered with amazing UUs in the great state of Georgia to change policy that



impacts each of us and our fellow Georgians. Our project with the Public Service Commission was exciting, energizing, and, as usual when one is fighting for the oppressed, somewhat depressing (in this after-action moment ONLY, because we must keep fighting).

We had UUCG folks showing up at two major public comments for the Integrated Resource Plan. We had UUs from other congregations in Metro Atlanta show up too! At the June 23rd event, the UUs from Savannah showed up and showed out. They drove up that morning to make public comments at the PSC. I was so inspired by their effort.

Between UUs from across GA, Interfaith Partners, Organizational Partners, and our UU T-Shirts from Side with Love, we enabled all the public comments on the 23rd to be heard. The public comments group were advised that because so many people had signed up to make public comment, the Commissioners would stop public comment at the one-hour mark. They wanted us to give up. But did we...NO WAY. With the inspiration of Josie Mitz and Rev. Hammamy from Side with Love, we learned and practiced some Climate Focused Justice/Protest songs right there in the hearing room. We planned to sing these songs if we were stopped from speaking. (The government was already recording the events in the hearing room.) The PSC staff came back prior to the comment period starting and advised all the folks in the room that the PSC would hear all comments. (I was called, as a leader of the action, to talk to a Capital Sergeant (Police) to make sure that our action would not happen because of the time extension. I advised, if EVERYONE gets to speak our action was not necessary.) EVERYONE SPOKE. So many different folks commented including loads of UUs with special kudos to the Savannah folks.

Getting Involved in Community Elections

In August, people who organize voting are gearing up for the November 4th elections here in Gwinnett County.

There are no federal or state legislative elections scheduled for 2025 in Georgia. The power of the vote this year is centered on 2 open seats on the state Public Service Commission and local municipal elections.

Two non-partisan ways to be involved are to register voters or help with voter education. Our "UU the Vote" initiative (https://uuthevote.org/) promotes being politically involved. The League of Women Voters (https://www.lwv.org/local-leagues/lwv-gwinnett-county) is a nonpartisan group that registers folks to vote and encourages election participation.

If you want to vote in both elections, expect to vote in two different places. The state election will be handled by the county, and voting will take place at county polling places. The Gwinnett County Elections Board website has the deadlines for getting an absentee ballot and mailing it, and the advanced-voting calendar. (https://www.gwinnettcounty.com/departments/elections)

Local elections will be held at city halls or other municipal buildings. Check your local city website for election information and where the voting will be held.

If you'd like to run in a council race, each city has qualifications, applications, application payments, and deadlines for applying listed on their websites. While every city's qualifications are different, Lilburn has a good qualifying packet posted that can give guidance on what to ask. (https://www.cityoflilburn.com/DocumentCenter/View/5670/Qualifying-Information---Candidates-2025)

If you're interested in becoming a poll worker, this county site explains the different jobs, pay scales, working hours, and when workers will be paid: https://www.gwinnettcounty.com/departments/elections/pollofficialapplication.
