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
Connecting Within

Message From the Minister



Longing to Belong by Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones (she/her)



Almost every time I arrive at a gathering where the group is new to me, I'm convinced that I won't really belong. Is this surprising? Maybe we extroverts look like we're at ease in any group; we get so much energy from being around

other people and we're often good at talking to strangers. But just like most of us in our culture, in the beginning I too feel like the oddball, the one that others won't understand or accept.

Toko-pa Turner, in her wonderful book Belonging: Remembering Ourselves Home, says that at the very heart of our ache to belong "is the longing to be recognized for one's gifts, to be welcomed in love and kinship, to feel a sense of purpose and necessity to our community." Yes, that's it! Deep down, our bodies and souls know how much we need each other. This longing to belong is written into our very DNA. No wonder it feels so painful, and sometimes life-threatening, when we feel left out.

But it's more than just a personal problem. When profit and wealth are more highly valued than living beings, then the culture has to create in its people a fear of not being or having enough. This leaves us all in an epidemic of alienation, of "unbelongingness," as Turner says. So what are we to do?

Well, Turner suggests that belonging is not a place where we find our beloveds, our people. Rather, it's a skill that we need to remember. It starts with looking honestly at this ache we share, with grieving and retrieving those parts of ourselves that we've tried to cut out so that we could fit in. It starts with belonging to ourselves again, the way we were born.

And it starts with building a community where all of our gifts and our imperfections are recognized and welcomed, where we get a chance to grow together, to become more ourselves both individually and as a community. Turner says that then maybe we can "open to the sacred dimension of our lives, [can] feel in service to something noble, [can] live in magic and wonder."

It's funny, but the first time I really recognized this pattern of feeling like I didn't belong in a new group was the first time I went to the Unitarian Universalists' General Assembly. Who were all these serious-looking people wearing comfortable shoes, carrying tote bags laden with books, walking or rolling with all due speed toward the next workshop, and mostly keeping to themselves? Coming from the world of theater, I didn't see myself in this crowd. But with some time and some risk taking, through talking with strangers with as much curiosity, courage, and compassion as I could muster, I began to remember that I too am as serious as I am wild, as scared and as brave as that person passing by me, and as much in need of comfort as I am of adventure. These Unitarian Universalists and I? Once we began to open ourselves beyond the boxes we'd been trained to occupy, we realized that we need each other's gifts, and we cherish each other's vulnerability.

This is how we'll Build Belonging at UUCG, too, beloveds. Welcome to this month, and here's to a new year of boldly loving ourselves, each other, and the friends and kindred we have yet to meet.

Pledging: A Promise and a Plan

Pledge Drive Season is upon us! This year, our vision is Building a Boldly Loving Community: Giving for Growth. Throughout September and October, we take a bold and loving look at the spiritual practice of supporting and growing this congregation through our financial giving and through the personal connections that this season's conversations create.

All our members and friends contribute to our congregational life in different ways, and every contribution matters. In this season, we look honestly at our financial giving. Money can be a sensitive topic, but as a congregation, we must face our needs boldly so that this loving community continues to grow in every sense.

Monetary giving is the primary way our congregation supports its staff, ministries, building and grounds, and everything else. To that end, we have set a Pledge Goal of \$110,000 with a Stretch Goal of \$120,000. Our Pledge Goal is a 10% increase over last year, and if met, it will allow us to meet our budgetary obligations without operating in a deficit. The Stretch Goal allows for UUCG to invest in much-needed projects that will help us grow for the future.





Did You Know There is a Georgia State Amphibian?

Don't tell McFly, but he is not the state amphibian! That honor belongs to the Green Treefrog.

An idea that originated in a 4th grade classroom at Armuchee Elementary School, in Rome, has finally been rewarded.

It was 2002 and the Armuchee School 4th graders, studying science and government with teachers Ruth Pinson and Marilyn McLean, discovered that the State of Georgia was not represented by an official amphibian.

In 2003, House Bill No. 256, designating an official state amphibian, was sponsored by Representative Barbara Reece, of Menlo.

Rep. Reese, a retired schoolteacher, could not get the bill passed by the House of Representatives. In 2004, House Bill No. 365, again sponsored by Rep. Reese, was introduced. This time, the legislation made it through the House of Representatives but failed in the Senate.

On January 24, 2005, Senate Bill No. 41 was introduced and read in the Georgia State Senate for the first time. In his bill, Senator Preston Smith of Rome proposed, for the third time in as many years, that the green treefrog be made the official amphibian of the State of Georgia.

The third time is the charm! This year, the tiny, 2" green treefrog was a shoe-in. In about two months the green treefrog garnered the approval of both houses of the Georgia General Assembly. It was forwarded to the governor on April 13.

It took the governor a little bit of time to get around to signing Preston Smith's legislation into law. But sign it he did. On May 9, 2005, Governor Sonny Purdue signed Senate Bill No. 41 into law making the green tree frog the "official Georgia state amphibian.

However, at this point the sales person was done with me and ready for the next customer. They had let go of the comradery goal and were now focussed on completing my transaction and moving on to the next person.





Recently, Gary and I went to a Gwinnett Stripers game at Coolray


Field on a hot and humid Wednesday night. We found our seats, got some drinks and suddenly our players were on the field, sporting colorful jerseys with

After a quick Google search, I found out that "Xolos," short for Xoloitzcuintli, are the National dog of Mexico. In Gwinnett County, we have an Hispanic community of almost 200,000 individuals, the majority of whom are from Mexican descent. It goes without saying, these are frightening times for this community. Yet, I'm sitting in a baseball stadium with baseball players proudly wearing jerseys celebrating Hispanic Heritage. Here was a clear example of building belonging, while standing up for the rights of others to live, work and play in our community.

Building belonging can be as visible as a baseball team embracing the diverse heritage of its community. It can also be celebrating Hispanic Heritage this month by participating in one of the many events being hosted around the metro area or taking time to think about all the ways our Hispanic neighbors contribute to our communal life. Engaging with others and learning more about their thoughts and ideas about belonging can help us embrace diversity and draw the circle wider. 



As the seasons shift and our lives flow through the inevitable currents of change, the idea of belonging can feel both grounding and elusive. At UUCG, our September theme of Building Belonging invites us to reflect on how we nurture connection—not just within the walls of our sanctuary, but beyond, into the wider world. This work feels especially urgent as we live into our annual vision of ministry: Our love is inclusive and defiant.

Change is the constant rhythm of life, and yet, it often challenges our sense of place and connection. Whether it's a personal transition, a shift in our community, or broader societal changes, we can feel unmoored. As Lay Minister of Connecting Beyond, I see this as an opportunity to live into the call of inclusive, defiant love. Belonging isn't about everyone being the same; it's about creating spaces where differences are honored, voices are heard, and people are welcomed without pretense or judgment.

True belonging, in this sense, is radical. It requires us to show up authentically, even when it's uncomfortable. It asks us to extend hospitality beyond those who look, think, or act like us. It challenges us to resist the forces that would isolate, divide, or exclude. In practicing this kind of love—this inclusive defiance we signal to each other that no one is on the outside of our care, our respect, or our commitment.

At UUCG, Connecting Beyond is a living embodiment of this principle. My role is to create and nurture pathways for engagement, ensuring that the bonds of community stretch not just among those already here, but also to those who may not yet feel they belong. This work is both joyful and demanding. It's joyful because it affirms the richness of our diversity and the beauty of shared discovery. It's demanding because it asks each of us to confront our assumptions, to welcome discomfort as a teacher, and to embrace the uncertainty inherent in change.

One of the ways we practice building belonging is by listening. Listening

deeply, with curiosity and care, to the experiences of others, especially those whose journeys differ from our own. In doing so, we weave a tapestry of understanding that allows us to move forward together, even in moments of disagreement or difference. Listening opens the door to empathy, and empathy is the soil in which trust—and ultimately belonging—grows.

Another essential practice is visibility. Defiant love shows itself not only in private acts of compassion but in public gestures of inclusion. It manifests in welcoming new faces, amplifying marginalized voices, and intentionally creating spaces where all feel invited to participate. These acts are small yet profound. They send the message that our community is not static, not reserved for the few, but alive, responsive, and expansive.

As we reflect this month on Building Belonging, I invite each of us to consider our own role in cultivating connection—both within UUCG and beyond. How do we reach out to those who feel unseen? How do we support each other through the transitions that life inevitably brings? How do we practice love that is at once inclusive and defiant, daring to embrace the unfamiliar while holding fast to our shared values?

Belonging is not a destination; it is a continuous practice. It asks for courage, presence, and patience. It is nurtured in moments of welcome, in acts of listening, and in the willingness to embrace change without fear. At UUCG, our love is indeed inclusive and defiant—and that love is what allows each of us to find our place, our voice, and our sense of home, even as we navigate life's ever-shifting landscape.

This September, may we all lean into the challenge and the promise of building belonging—recognizing that in doing so, we not only connect with each other but also participate in the greater work of connecting beyond.

Update on Familias Juntas

Thank you all for your recent support for Familias Juntas through the second quarter Give Away the Plate program. Familias Juntas is a coalition of concerned Gwinnett County individuals and faith communities, whose goal is to assist immigrants in danger of or affected by family separation, due to inhumane immigration policies.

The organization came from our church and The Nett Church (the United Methodist Church, also on Bethesda Church Road). We have gathered a group of lawyers, notaries, and interpreters to enable immigrants (undocumented and otherwise) to obtain a "Power of Attorney for Care of a Minor Child." This document allows parents to name who would care for their children if they are detained or deported. Otherwise, those children are in danger of becoming wards of the state.

First, we educated ourselves through attending multiple training programs, offered by the Presbyterian Church, the Methodist Church, and the Immigrant Legal Resource Center. Then our head lawyer, Jane Thorpe, organized a training program for attorneys. There she met attorneys from another organization, Atlanta House of Hope, who were doing the same work that we are.

Since then, we have been in close contact and cooperation with Atlanta House of Hope. We assisted at some of their document clinics, held at Catholic Churches in metro Atlanta. We have held our own workshops at an Episcopal Church in Lawrenceville and at a Latino-serving library in Athens.

This week, the two organizations coordinated to hold our first document clinic at the Mexican Consulate in Atlanta. This venue provides us with a ready population and a safe space. We anticipate holding regular workshops there and then moving out to other Consulates in the area.

In addition to these POA workshops, we want to financially assist families affected by separation. Fortunately, family separation has not affected many families yet, but we were able to offer assistance to one local family who lost their father. We anticipate this aspect of our services to increase in the near future. The US now has approximately 60,000 immigrants in custody and is working hard to build additional retention centers (concentration camps). This is more than at any other time in American history.

From our congregation, I especially want to thank notaries Jenn McCutcheon and Peggy Averyt, as well as Sue Ann Soloway for her administrative support. We can still use attorneys, notaries and interpreters, whether members of the congregation or not. We can also use your prayers and good intentions, plus your willingness to stay educated and to advocate in your circles.



The Lawrenceville Cooperative Ministry has been serving the citizens of Gwinnett County, Georgia since 1995, that seeks to care for those in the Lawrenceville and Dacula communities. We are an emergency food bank helping those in need by providing food, personal care items and connections to other helping resources. One of our primary goals is to help clients get back on their feet.


