

Message From the Minister



Imagining the Past to Find Hope in the Present

To help my grand-niece with an elementary school project, my brother and I go looking for our maternal ancestor who immigrated to this country from France. As I take a joyful dive down the rabbit hole of research, I discover my great-great-uncle Nicholas Ohmer, who happens to share my birthday in mid April just 129 years earlier. His father Francis, a tailor, traveled with Nicholas and the rest of the family in 1832, landing eventually in Ohio.

A tribute to Nicholas written after his death in 1903 tells us that he was an enthusiastic, kind man who grew hundreds of acres of pears, raspberries, and other fruits for a living in the second half of his life.



What really catches my eye is this sentence: "A devout Catholic in religion, he was tolerant and liberal. He believed that 'above all sects is truth' and 'above all nations is humanity." My Uncle Nicholas was a universalist, all those years ago! I feel a spark of

encouragement and hope, imagining how he tried to live his life. How does this legacy help me to live a more radically inclusive life now?

I often fuel my energy and determination by imagining the future we want to create. Yet in recent weeks I have been gleaning hope and direction by looking to the past for examples of courage and resistance in especially difficult times. From Pauli Murray, the poet-lawyer-activist-Episcopal priest who helped revolutionize the fight for civil rights for Black people and for women yet who went unheralded for years, to Mies Giep, the Dutch office worker who aided the Otto Frank family and many other Jewish people striving to evade the Nazis in The Netherlands during World War II, and many more, I am finding examples of brave people who defied the authorities and who transcended their own limits.

Studying these ancestors' stories, I imagine what they must have felt as they faced those dangers and took those risks. I imagine how strongly motivated they were by a sense of people's worthiness and beauty. I imagine how fiercely they held Love at the center of all they did.

This month, as we Live Love Through the Practice of Imagination, I hope we all look for the ancestors, by blood or temperament or values, whose lives spark our imaginations and inspire us to embody courage, resistance, and Love.

Celebrating the 200th Anniversary of the American Unitarian Association!

On May 25-26, 1825, a group of Unitarian leaders created the American Unitarian Association (AUA), the first organization in the United States to claim the name Unitarian. The AUA was open to Unitarian ministers and lay leaders as individuals; the congregational structure didn't take form until 1884. And through a wonderful coincidence—or perhaps by the force of the radical ideas swirling in the transatlantic air—the British and Foreign Unitarian Association was also formed on May 25, 1825!

Up until Rev. William Ellery Channing's bold sermon in Baltimore in May 1819, "Unitarian" had been a slur thrown at the liberal Christians who rebelled against Calvinism's strict interpretation of the Trinity and the predestined fate of sinful humans. Unitarians, as Channing explained, believed in the unity of God (and the fully human and inspired nature of Jesus), the use of reason to interpret the Bible, and the possibility of human growth toward the good.

Just five years later, enough people were calling themselves Unitarian to merit creating an organization for the religion. This shows just how hungry people were for Unitarianism's hopeful, empowering message.

Still, the group of educated white men who created the AUA in 1825 had serious differences and limits on their imaginations. The AUA never officially opposed slavery, for instance. Although most Unitarians were abolitionists, our ancestors also include Unitarians such as U.S. President Millard Fillmore and Vice President John C. Calhoun whose words and actions supported the institution of slavery.

Why shall we celebrate this 200th anniversary, then? Here are two reasons:

- The Courage to Resist the Status Quo: In creating the AUA, our ancestors were brave enough to claim the truths that would ultimately demand the recognition of the worthiness and dignity of all. They were brave enough to set themselves apart from the majority culture and to form an institution with the purpose of continuing to learn and grow.
- The Encouragement to Grow and Change: From the beginning, Unitarians set themselves on a course to grow and change. Acknowledging the growth of our faith in depth and breadth in these last 200 years—and noticing how much more we want to grow—is a great way to round out this program year at UUCG.



Questions to Ponder:

How shall we embody the boldness and courage, the commitment to growth and change that we have inherited? What will we create in the year to come?

The month of May is designated as Mental Health Awareness Month. Since the pandemic, there has been a myriad of news coverage and celebrities sharing their mental health journeys openly on camera. The isolation that was felt worldwide only exacerbated an already growing epidemic of depression, anxiety, and other challenges among our nation's, and the world's, youth. Adults also reported an uptick in depression and anxiety symptoms, and those who were already battling mental illness struggled to find support and balance as care went strictly online.

Five years later, students and the public in general are still reeling from the trauma of the pandemic, with little if any acknowledgment from those in power of what we collectively went through. Now that we are here, how do we move forward physically, mentally, and spiritually? How can we acknowledge the trauma that we share and attend to those most impacted? How do we continue to care for one another?

Living Under the Beltane Sun A Season of Abundance and Imagination

Beltane, for me, is far more than just a date on the calendar—it's a vibrant season of waking up, blooming, imagination, and abundance. May 1st is when we celebrate Beltane or May Day, a time festivals that welcome summer's warm embrace. At this time Beltane fires are lit to offer protection and build comradery. However, the Beltane season encourages us to bask in its glow throughout the summer.

Damh the Bard's song "Under the Beltane Sun" reminds us that Beltane extends beyond a single evening of celebration. His sings to mind vivid images of children playing in a creek or river, picking wild black berries and listening to the birds along the way. I play this song on repeat and it becomes a portal—a journey into my child hood summers.

I would sometimes stay with my Aunt in the summer, she lived on a few acres of land by a lake. It was a wild child's dream. Since I was by myself, I would craft people out of pinecones, bottle cap caps, sticks for hands and feet, and leaves for clothes. Cicada shells were the babies of my pinecone people. I would make a house of of stones and build a little pinecone people town telling stories of what they accomplished. I would wandering barefoot in the dirt and dream about my future. I long for that kind of freedom now—to be back in those days where my pinecone people could take me anywhere.

It's amazing how a song can stir up memories that the heart quietly held for years. Damh the Bard does just that. He reconnects me to those sunlit days and playful worlds built from nature and my imagination. Those stories, that wonderment, is still alive somewhere deep within me—and maybe in you, too.

Summer for me is not simply hot days and vacations; it's a sacred time for creativity, passion, connection, and growth. Beltane is the gateway into that sacred season.

So, let your heart wander for a while:

What would it feel like to live this season as though you truly belonged to the Earth—completely, freely, and joyfully?


What might blossom within you if you dared to dance under the Beltane sun—not just for a fleeting moment, but all season long?



When I first started coming to UUCG, one of the things that drew me in was the vibrant sense of possibility. Coming from Charleston - where I was involved in planning events and regularly engaged with the broader community - I was excited to find a congregation where that same spirit lived. I saw so much potential for connection and collaboration, both within our walls and beyond them.

Now, nearly seven years later, it's incredible to reflect on how far we've come. We've grown so much as a community, and we've deepened our connections in so many meaningful ways. But even more exciting is how many new opportunities are still ahead of us, just waiting to be imagined into being.

Imagine our congregation hosting a **monthly** farmer's market, inviting local growers and artisans to share their abundance. Imagine seasonal plant and seed swaps that celebrate sustainability and invite neighbors to share in the rhythm of the earth. Imagine gardening workshops where folks learn how to grow their own food-and a community garden where they can grow it with us.



Now imagine even more:

- **Skill-sharing workshops** where people teach and learn everything from canning and sewing to bike repair and budgeting.
- Support groups for grief, parenting, or mental health, held in a space that feels safe and welcoming.
- A free little pantry or fridge, stocked with essentials for those who need them.
- · Job fairs, resource clinics, or resume**building events**, giving people tools to move forward.
- Art shows, open mics, and local music **nights**, where the creative spirit of our community shines.

Imagination is more than wishful thinking - it is the beginning of transformation. As George Bernard Shaw wrote,

"Imagination is the beginning of creation. You imagine what you desire, you will what you imagine, and at last, you create what you will."
