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


Living With Intention

From the Board

Happy New Year! May 2022 bring tidings of great joy to you and your people.

Following the service, on January 23, UUCG will hold a Town Hall meeting to begin discussions on the current effort underway to update Article II of our national UUA bylaws. This is part of an administrative move on the part of the Unitarian Universalist Association, our national denominational organization. On the one hand, such conversations can seem dry and remote. On the other hand, Article II contains the Unitarian Universalist Principles and Purposes, the heart of who we covenant to be in relationship with one another and the world.

Unitarian Universalism is a living faith and as such, has no creeds or central beliefs. Our current Principles and Purposes, which you can view here, have not been revised since 1987. Since that time, there have been national discussions on updates to the 1st, 5th and 7th principles. There has also been a call to add a new 8th principle, dealing with anti-racism

The UUA has created an Article II Study Commission and has issued to that Commission the charge linked <u>here</u>. Originally the Commission was to present its findings to the UUA board in January of 2022 (now), but that deadline has been updated to January of 2023, in order to fully engage member congregations and individual congregants in the conversation.

Our January 23 Town Hall meeting will be a local introduction to a national dialogue. You will hear an outline of the facts, and then we will engage in brainstorming about our personal principles and how we have come to those. True to UU form, there are disagreements at both the national and the local (UUCG) levels. Dialogue is healthy, and differing points of view are to be expected, but our conversations must be grounded in Love. "We are not strangers," states Lay Minister for Spiritual Growth Bob Patrick. "We are a long-standing community and we love each other." I look forward to envisioning the next articulation of UUism with you.

The A2SC is a function of the UUA bylaws, for the periodic review of the Covenant between the Member Congregations. In consultation with the General Assembly, the Board of Trustees charged the A2SC to include the essence of the 8th Principle.

The 8th Principle Project is a grassroots movement started in 2013, aimed at articulating a commitment to dismantle racism and other forms of oppression within the Covenants made between and within the Member Congregations of the UUA.

Adopting the 8th Principle at the local level is an act of covenant making amongst the members of that Congregation, to be anti-racist. The Covenant between Congregations can be shaped by engaging in the A2SC process, and voting on the amended Article II at the 2023 and 2024 General Assemblies.

These responses are our fellow community members answers to the open questions 2 & 3. These responses matter even more than before due to the absence of Real Life community, where growth happens in a more organic way. Please read these responses in preparation to move forward as a community.

What personal and organizational needs must be addressed to move fully into our vision and what resources do we have to help us meet them?

- I feel we need a strong Communications Team to make sure everyone within our congregation and beyond our walls will know what is happening and being done at UUCG.
- Mentoring, diverse Leadership Teams, and inclusive decision-making.
- Active participation from the congregation and financial support.
- Care Circles and Phone trees. We should have a Care Committee Chair and Leads from Each Circle who meet monthly for updates regarding our needs and health. Then we publish the results in our Newsletter
- Our Blue Building is hidden from the view of those passing by. A sign with changing messages will say "here we are, this is what we are about, come see what we are doing."
- More public events would be great... trunk or treat events, etc. I liked the idea of a "worship in the park" service.
- We need to follow the "build it and they will come" attitude in renewing a strong RE program. In a county with the largest school population in Georgia, there are many families with kids who would find us and join us if we only provided a program for them. Recognizing that this will not work while we are in Zoom mode, we need to plan to expand RE when we return to in person.
- Most people of the Millennial age (elder Millennials are approaching 40), Gen Z, etc. use Instagram, Tik Tok, and Snapchat much more often than email and Facebook. A lot of organizations and even churches use Tik Tok and Tik Tok trends to spread news.
- Social justice is our spiritual practice. Social justice issues could be best served in chalice circle settings, to address personal fears and express hopes. Sermons need to be more joyful in order to inspire us throughout the week to do the work. Personal testimonies in the form of reflections will also work.

In what ways does UUCG meet your spiritual needs and how can we support each other in our spiritual journey?

- UUCG meets my spiritual needs by having thoughtful and meaningful worship services each week, and by providing opportunities for me to connect with and learn from others within our congregation.
- Everyone deserves to have their story cherished and celebrated- past, present, and future. We have not heard the Community until all voices are heard.
- I think Jan does a very good job of meeting our pastoral needs. I am very glad that there is a liberal religious present in Gwinnett county; we are doing that, for sure. I also think Lorena is doing a fabulous job.
- I am excited to be involved in the faith development for families with young children. I did not think that this was well publicized though because I only found out about it through another member. We need to make sure that these opportunities are clear perhaps by Reverend Jan mentioning them at the service. I have thoroughly enjoyed the faith development programs I have experienced.
- A feeling of acceptance. Messages that align with who I am
- The Community of people. Just being available to listen to each other, and our stories.
- I find the ability to connect with a community that holds progressive values similar to my own to be reaffirming.
- It's good to have access to programs related to race awareness, to covenant groups, and like-minded community support. I enjoy the Sunday morning services on Zoom.
- As UU's we bring our spirituality to the table and align our beliefs with what we choose.
- The themes, programs, and worship services open the doors to the questions of ultimacy, to environmental connectedness, to a search for meaning, but the answers are within us.
- Our many varied services with an emphasis on personal search for spirituality provide a strong attraction for the people who value reason and science and yet are open to others ideas.
- Take all these surveys and make a plan with a timeline. Periodically let the congregation know how we are doing with it and if we do not reach 50% of the goal after a specific time period, scrap it and start over. What is the point of doing these surveys if nothing ever comes of the data?
- Adult RE and WOW are helping to expand my understanding of the world.
- The community, the widening of perspectives, the reinforcement of an open mind... I am thoroughly enjoying both this church and the people I've met and learned from so far

Covenant Groups 2022



Lay Ministry: Radical Welcome

Message from the Lay Minister

As I journey on my spiritual path, I am grateful for the UUCG community. I learn through pictures, hands-on experiences, and interactions with my fellow earth dwellers. I am currently working through my thoughts, feelings, and actions about the model in the graphic, which helps me understand myself better.

This graphic comes from a history of learning about and utilizing Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (That model uses Thoughts-Behaviors-Feelings in the three circles.) to improve my life. It may also be informed by attendance at



the Southern Unitarian Universalist Leadership Experience (SUULE), and Maryjane Stout has reminded me they use the "triune model" where the three circles are Feeling (Emotional), Thinking (Intellectual), and Being (Physical) – triune meaning three in one. In this model, the center of the circle is the individual.

I give you the history so that you might understand how this model informs the way I am moving through this world. I will tell that my circles of spirit are not of one size at different times and interactions. I work to fill each process so that I stay balanced in spirit. I don't always succeed. That's what makes this a journey.

How does this connect to the UUCG mission of Curiosity, Courage, Compassion? For me, Curiosity is related to the mind, Courage is connected to the Body, and Compassion is connected to the Heart. These come together in Community which is my spirit. My spirit is fed when I connect to people, and I believe that feeds our whole community. It is so much more than this simple graphic. Sometimes mind (intellect, thoughts) takes over, and sometimes body (being, behaviors). My goal in interaction and community is to focus on the heart (emotions, feelings).

For me, listening to each other's stories takes compassion and heart energy most of all. This heart energy is strengthened by the curiosity of learning a variety of different things and the courage of my body to keep at it. Each person's story is their story. My story is my story. Our story may be how we accept each other and help each other listen and hear those stories while we are on our spiritual journey.

With radical welcome, we are trying to figure out how to create spaces of acceptance and love while honoring uniqueness. Join some folks at the Radical Welcome Study Hall on January 7th at 6:30 PM-8:30 PM on Zoom as we work to define what we mean by radical welcome. And yes, radical welcome is part of our vision statement, but I am not sure we have fully defined that yet.
