



Gadding About

A dear friend of mine, who has long since died, shared with me a wisdom about hospitality that he was taught growing up in southern Virginia (he definitely saw this as a Southern perspective!). He was taught that it was important to treat every guest like a jewel on a velvet pillow. He would talk with me about how important it was to make every person who entered his home feel important and special. I think of this as making every guest feel like they matter.

I believe “mattering” is an essential human need that is often overlooked. What if we, as people of faith, made sure that every person among us felt like they mattered?

What does this require of each of us? How might we do this? Certainly, as the minister, many of you make me feel like I matter. I receive feedback that lets me know that what I say and what I do makes a difference ... sometimes that feedback is constructive in helping me be a better minister, and sometimes it is affirming about what I’m doing well. Both are welcome!

How might we do the same for all of us in creating this shared ministry? How do we make sure everyone has the opportunity to share this ministry? What if, instead of treating guests like a jewel on a velvet pillow we treated every person like a jewel on a velvet pillow? Not like a fragile being, but as a precious being? Beings who require ways to connect and contribute to the community? Beings who need affirmation, constructive feedback, the tools and resources to be fulfilled in their lay ministry, and the knowledge that their part in our community is needed and essential? How might we also care for one another to prevent burn-out in our ministries and share the leadership so that all can experience the joy of contributing, and mattering?

How might we practice radical hospitality, radical welcome, not just for the guests coming in our doors each week ... which is indeed very important ... but for every person who is here among us week in and week out? What assumptions might we need to let go of? What do we need to examine within ourselves about the inherent biases that shape our expectations of one another? What if we engaged in deep conversations about what gifts we bring, what passions we have to share, and what needs we hope to have met?

There is an abundance of gifts here at UUCG. Each person brings life experiences, skills, passions, talents, and so much more to enrich our community. I urge you to use every opportunity to have a real and deep and “mattering” conversation with someone at least once a month ... more if you can! One opportunity for such conversations is coming up this month ... if you are invited to have a conversation with a Visiting Steward, please give an enthusiastic YES! so we can share with one another what we love about UUCG and what matters to each of us in building the Beloved Community.

- **October 8: Spiritual Practice - *Elemental Movement*.** Experience the 5 elements of earth, air, fire, water, and spirit as expressed through your body. To Be Continued: Sabbatical Enhances Trust, Strengthens Compassion, and Renews Inquiry

Recently, UUCG completed our most significant accomplishment as partners in Ministry with Reverend Taddeo. I’ve admired everyone’s contributions, welcomed new experiences, and discovered that I have much to learn.

Reverend Dawn Cooley, a “Sabbatical veteran” herself and our Congregational Life Primary Contact from the Southern Region of the UUA, helped lead the “Sabbatical Reboot” weekend. Friday evening was for the Congregation, Saturday was for Leadership, and Sunday was for our celebration- both of Sabbatical and of our relationship with the wider world of UU-ism through the UUA.

We were invited to ask ourselves some questions. How had our involvement and our plans changed? What was our vision for the future- one, three, and five years from now? From our new experiences, did we find talents we weren’t aware of, or see them in others? Were there areas where we didn’t make progress?

We used the “1-3-5” approach to discuss our future with UUCG- where we see ourselves one, three, and five years from now. We used the RACI (Responsible, Accountable, Consulted, Informed) chart to begin to break out the tasks of our shared Ministry and discuss who held those roles.

Throughout the weekend, I made use of a great “focusing statement” from the words of Reverend Cooley: “I believe our mission is to love the hell out of the world. This means being in relationship with the world. It means constantly expanding who “we” are. It means challenging ourselves to listen more and put down our need to be right all the time. It does not mean we will always agree – we won’t – but it means we will stay in conversation without trying to convince the other person we are right. We will stay in conversation because we will want to hear more about their story.”

We generated far more questions than answers- and those questions deserve more conversation. So, important work remains: Continue this work of “listening each other into speech.” Provide opportunities for folks to gather in small “cottage meeting” groups to define our future in shared Ministry together. Do the work of finding our “sweet spot” - the place where our passions and interests intersect with the needs of our community and the larger world. Continue to refine our 1-3-5 year goals, and to better define our roles with our RACI chart.

The opportunities start immediately, as we kick off our Pledge Drive with a “what do we love about our Beloved Community” question. And, that conversation will continue in cottage meetings. Because, dear friends, to “Love the Hell Out of the World” most effectively, we need to know some things. What resources do we need? What relationships do we need to build? How do we prepare ourselves to navigate (both “from the front” and “from the rear”) the challenges that lie ahead?

As this Program Year progresses, so will our understanding of the Strategic Plan for our shared Ministry. And, as we enter the next Program Year, our Strategic Plan (changing with the times, of course) will inform and guide our actions as we reach for our goals together

What's Social Justice All About?

If you are new to UUCG, you may have wondered what the Social Justice Committee is all about. Our monthly meetings are a review of what the church is involved in with our community, standing up for the issues our shared values lead us to.

Our focus has been on civil rights, LGBTQ equity, immigration reform, environmental sustainability and racial justice. An issue may be spotlighted based on happenings in our world, UUA recommendations, or congregational interest. New committees like the Green Team and the Racial Equity Committee are born when targeted education and action are needed.

Everyone involved in social justice at UUCG doesn't come to meetings. There is no requirement to meet to be involved. Everyone is invited to show up to the annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Parade, the Pride Parade, protest marches, visits to el Refugio, collections for Corley Elementary School, educational events and many others forms of participation.

Watch for announcements in the GNUUS, weekly updates in printed material on Sundays, UUCG Facebook and the Friday email. The Faith in Action Bulletin Board has an annual events calendar and a monthly calendar that is being updated frequently. Look for an event you are passionate about and show up. The first rule of working for social justice is showing up.



Life After Hate

Recipient for 4th quarter Give Away the Plate program

Life After Hate is a nonprofit organization that counters violent extremism through intervention and prevention. It was both founded and is run completely by former violent extremists, mostly defectors from the violent far-right. This organization is “dedicated to inspiring individuals to a place of compassion and forgiveness” and is engaged in research, outreach, education, and consulting. Its major program helps radicalized individuals disengage from extremist movements and begin the process of deradicalization. The unique experiences of the staff position them in the best place possible to understand the challenges and support needed to assist those who want to leave an extremist movement, or who have already done so on their own. The

organization also supports community practitioners (counselors, social workers, faith leaders, etc.) and families who are working with individuals who have the desire to change. Located in Chicago, Life After Hate is active in the US and in Canada.

UUA/UUSC Hurricane Harvey Recovery and Relief Fund had two dedicated plates in September and UUCG raised \$1,361.01 for the fund.





Serving With Grace: What's the Purpose? A Message from Theresa Waldrop, President of UUCG

At its last meeting, the board of trustees began reviewing UUCG's bylaws, as this is the task we have set for ourselves this program year. I thought we were starting off easy by reviewing just the first four articles: Name, Purpose, Denominational Affiliation and Non-Discrimination. Sounds pretty easy, right? And certainly sounds less challenging than, say, the fifth -- Membership, which could take a few sessions to cover.

So: Article I. Name. "The name of this organization shall be "Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett," hereinafter referred to as "UUCG" or "this congregation." Ok. Even for us UUs, who like to discuss things, this presented no questions or issues.

But then: Article II, Section 2.1 - Purpose: The Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett is a supportive religious community whose purposes are to explore spirituality, celebrate humanity, and respect diversity, inspired by the Principles and Purposes of the Unitarian Universalist Association.

As you can imagine, we spent most of our discussion time on this one. Of course, we mean no disrespect to our founding members or the members who must have poured so much thought and work into putting our bylaws together in the first place. But the world surely looks a lot different (darker? Or is it just me?) than it did in 1981.

So, perhaps, if we were to edit our purpose, we might add something about promoting equality and social justice, or just helping to heal our world. Something along those lines.

How would you describe our purpose? As we begin our pledge drive with a discussion of what UUCG means to each of us, it's a good question to ask.

By the way, you can read our bylaws online, under the section About Us, Governance.

Business the board decided:

- Approved adding one person to the nursery staff. This won't increase overall hours or costs, but rather widen the pool of people available to be in the nursery when needed.
- Identified two people willing to form a policy-review task force. We need just one more! Rev. Jan is working on drafting a charter for the task force.

Safety & Security Training

UUCG is going to conduct a Safety/Security Training activity on Saturday, November 18, from Noon to 4 p.m. A few parts of this class will be specific to our building, but much will be generic and applicable to just about anyone, anywhere. We will cover tornado and fire response, then a Training Officer from Gwinnett County PD will conduct a session on how to respond should an active attacker/shooter event ever happen. Following his presentation, we will role-play various scenarios in our building to get an idea of how we might best respond to various situations that could occur.

The classroom training will be from noon until approximately 2 p.m., after which attendees can participate in some or all of the different role-play situations we plan to conduct. The practice role-play portion should last until around 4 p.m.

Calculating my Pledge for UUCG

Each year for the past 7 years, I have spent time learning more and more about pledging and giving. I have been inspired by visionary folks like: Lisa Earle McLeod about giving until you're happy, Debra Greenwood who brings her faith heritage concept of tithing at 10%, Toby Lyles recollection of going to church as a youth and having the opportunity to drop her gift in the basket, Bert Schuster who remembers everything he loves about UUCG when he pledges, etc. All of you

inspire my pledge and gift at the visionary level.

Pledging and giving to me mean that I am supporting UUCG and the work we do with my time, talent and treasure. It makes me happy to know that I am helping along with everyone else to make a difference in reaching our vision and living our mission. It means that I can say I am walking alongside folks like Sue Ann Soloway and Peggy & Dave Averyt who were original founders of UUCG and continue to gift our congregation with their time, talent and treasure. I am doing my part to make sure that UUCG is here now and in the future.

So, how do I calculate what I will give? I look at my annual salary. I calculate my major expenses for the year – education, retirement account, major house repair, and major medical. That is what I use for my Adjusted Gross Income, and what I use to calculate my percentage of salary for my gift level.

Then I look at my budget. I make sure that I have enough money to pay my mortgage, utilities, car payment, loan payments, basic medical expenses, food and clothing. Then I look at where I am spending money on entertainment and gifts as well as other donations. What do I spend where? Am I spending my money on things that evidence my values in the world?

Then I see what I can give from my budget. I compare that dollar amount as a percentage of my Adjusted Gross Income. My goal is to be in the Visionary level of giving moving toward the Transformer level (see chart below). Last year I was at 7%, and this year I was able to increase to 7.5%. I did have to give up about \$25 a month of food dollars. But those food dollars include beer and wine that I could give up as those items don't actually live into my values. I can still use some funds from my entertainment budget if I want some beer or wine with a meal.

This is just my thought process of how to calculate my pledge for UUCG. My pledge evidences my UU faith and helps me live out my values and makes me happy. You need to find a pledge that will make you happy and live out your values. I hope you will look closely at your pledge for the coming year and see if you can nudge toward the next higher level of giving.

No matter what, remember that your gifts to UUCG are important. If you are invited to meet with a Visiting Steward, please say yes to this opportunity explore why you are in community with us at UUCG.

It equips participants with accurate, age-appropriate information and helps participants clarify their values, build interpersonal skills, and understand the spiritual, emotional, and social aspects of sexuality. OWL provides a safe and judgment free environment to ask questions and get answers leading to informed choices. OWL is tentatively scheduled to resume in the 2017-2018 program year. Parents planning to enroll teens need to attend the Parent Meeting on November 5.
