

The Yin-Yang of Mystery by John Daido Loori

The Chinese character for mystery, oryugen, is the character for mountain, which looks like an inverted letter T with two squiggles on each side of the vertical line. This line is the mountain, and the squiggles on either side represent the mist in the valley that invokes a certain anticipation of the hidden.

Mystery is usually associated with the darker side of life, with death or fear of the unknown. In religion and art, mystery is light itself. It's the lifeblood that pumps through true religious and artistic practice. Mystery is the itch that you can't scratch, the driving force of spiritual and creative journeys. It sets in motion the basic questions of our existence. It fuels genuine scientific investigation. It invites us to peek around the next corner, into the darkness....

When we expect a certain result, only two things can happen: We will either find what we're looking for or we won't. Either way, we are blind to all other possibilities because we're focused on our expectation. Don't expect, in life or in art. Open yourself to discovery. Enjoy the mystery. All the good stuff is hidden in the dark corners. It's what gives life its sense of vitality.

The human imagination is infinitely powerful and profound. It allows each person to bring to the work of art something that is unique to him or her.... In art, mystery is touched through understatement and implication. Mystery abhors naked exposure and explanation.

Sewer Project: Please check the bulletin board next to the Pastor's Parlor for regular updates about our project to connect with the Gwinnett County Sewer System. Here's what was presented at the Town Hall Meeting on April 28. We are still waiting on bids from contractors as of May 1st, and the Easement forms will be delivered to Park 156 on May 2nd. When those are returned and submitted to the county, then our design plan can move forward for permitting.

Parking Lot Repair: We have long been concerned about the large hole that has developed in our parking lot, consuming several of our parking spaces and creating a hazard. Don Graff has done considerable work to clear the area and prepare it for repair. He has also obtained several estimates for the repairs over the last few years. Estimates range from \$14,000 to \$35,000, but we have a way forward to create a sturdy, temporary repair that is estimated at \$3,000 plus a lot of us coming together to do the labor. This repair will hold up until we can engage in a full Capital Campaign to do more expansive work on the parking lot as well as other dream projects, like updating our HVAC system, expanding the Sanctuary, and renovating other parts of our building. Work on this will begin this spring ... and MANY HANDS will be needed! Dates will be announced soon!

Green New Deal Town Hall May 8

This event is sponsored by the Green Team. Grassroots Gwinnett is holding a Town Hall at UUCG Wednesday, May 8 from 7:30-9:30pm for Gwinnett Residents. The world's top scientists warn we have 12 years to take action to avoid the catastrophic effects of climate change. Join us in a conversation on what a Green New Deal means for the U.S., Georgia, and Gwinnett County. We will have speakers from several environmental groups to discuss how we can have an equitable Green New Deal to uplift oppressed communities, the issues in Georgia you should be concerned about, and actions you can take to get involved and stay informed. We will have many speakers including Caleb Scott with the Sunrise Movement of Atlanta, Isoke Lugman and Chandra Farley with Representatives from Partnership for Southern Equity / Justice Energy Circle, and Anthony Pacheco with Asian Americans Advancing Justice.

The Green New Deal is a plan to fight climate change. It would reduce greenhouse gas emissions, cutting them in half by 2030. That's what it would take to limit global warming to less than 2.7 degrees Fahrenheit by 2100 which is the Paris Agreement's most ambitious climate goal. On February 7, 2019, Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, D-N.Y., and Representative Edward Markey, D-Mass., introduced a five-page nonbinding resolution to the House. Sixty House members endorsed the plan. So did four Senate Democrats running for president. That ensures that solutions to climate change will be a major issue in 2020. It includes seven goals:

- 1. Shift 100% of national power generation to renewable sources.
- 2. Build a national energy-efficient "smart" grid.
- 3. Upgrade all buildings to become energy efficient.
- 4. Decarbonize manufacturing and agricultural industries.
- Decarbonize, repair, and upgrade the nation's infrastructure, especially transportation. 5.
- Fund massive investment in the drawdown and capture of greenhouse gases.

Adopting these goals would make "green" technology, industry, expertise, products, and services a major U.S. export. As a result, America could become an international leader in helping other countries transition to completely carbon-neutral economies.





Member Spotlight: JoAnn Weiss



This month we are shining the light on a beloved member of 18 years, JoAnn Weiss. JoAnn, and her husband, Steve Babb, raised their children at UUCG. Steve and JoAnn have been together 34 years, married for 28. JoAnn feels blessed to have a husband who is equally social justice minded and supports her in her various ministries. Their two adult children, Josh and Isabel, carry on the passion for social justice they learned from their parents and this congregation.

JoAnn and Steve came here looking for a good faith community to raise a family in because they had different religious backgrounds and hadn't been to a church in awhile. JoAnn has been a leader of Religious Education, Our Whole Lives, and the Coming of Age Program. She served on the Leadership Development Committee, chaired the Social Justice Committee, served with two Ministerial Search Committees, and the Green Team. Currently she is on the Social Justice Committee and offers her expertise to support our efforts for immigrant justice. JoAnn teaches yoga at UUCG on Wednesday nights in the Sanctuary so come spend time on the mat with her in our sacred space!

JoAnn is the Chairperson of the Board of Directors for El Refugio. She is also the House Coordinator. She writes grants and looks for funding sources. JoAnn visits different faith communities in the area and teaches about immigration justice and invites members to visit El Refugio with her. She does about 24 talks a year, which is why we don't see her as often on Sunday mornings!

El Refugio formed in 2010 at a small house in Lumpkin. It offers a ministry of hospitality and visitation serving immigrants detained at Stewart Detention Center, their families and friends. Georgia has 3 for-profit detention centers, which is the 4th largest number of any state in the U.S. JoAnn is grateful for UUCG's involvement with and generous support of this ministry since 2011.

Recently, comedian Samantha Bee visited El Refugio and decided to buy them a gorgeous historic house which offers much more room for the families staying there. On April 30th, the Indigo Girls did a concert at the Variety Playhouse to raise money for El Refugio. If you would like to help, you can visit with JoAnn during an organized trip she will announce soon, or you can donate items for deportation bags such as new or slightly used men's clothing and sneakers size 7.5-10. There is a collection bin at UUCG organized by Sara Heath.





Recently, JoAnn was presented with the Yellow Rose Award by State Representative Shelly Hutchinson of House District 107. This award is given by the Georgia Women's Legislative Caucus to women who have done exemplary service work. Shelly Hutchinson nominated JoAnn because of her dedicated selfless work with El Refugio.

JoAnn has a Bachelor's degree from Georgetown University in Government, a Master's in International Relations from the University of Denver, and a Master's in Public Health from San Jose State. She is a teacher of Adult Education at Gwinnett Technical College, and teaches yoga at several places in Gwinnett County.

JoAnn appreciates that the UU faith takes more of a humanistic, responsible viewpoint than using one religious text for guidance. She notes that UUs are not afraid to walk into really heavy duty social justice issues like Black Lives Matter. UUs tackle the hard issues such as being more welcoming, environmental issues, and immigration justice. Though there is struggle and mistakes are made, UUs are still willing to put themselves out there and live out their values with conviction.

May 19 Congregational Meeting Motion Language

Motion 1 Language

Article VI. Organizational Structure

- **Section 6.3.4 Composition of the Board**. The Board shall consist of seven *eight* voting members: a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, *treasurer-elect*, and three (3) members-at-large.
 - **Officers:** The president, vice president, secretary, *treasurer*, and treasurer-*elect* shall be of legal age and are designated as the officers of the congregation.
 - Members At-Large: Members At-Large shall be of legal age.
 - **Minister:** The minister of the congregation shall serve as an ex-officio member, without voting privileges, of the Board.
 - **Youth Representation:** Up to two (2) Associate Members may be elected to serve on the Board as ex-officio, youth representatives. Associate Members do not have voting privileges and do not have legal fiduciary responsibility.
- **Section 6.3.5 Duties of the Officers and Trustees**. Members of the Board shall perform those duties associated with their office in the Policies and Procedures Manual and as follows:
 - The **President** shall preside at all meetings of the Board and at all Legal Business Meetings of UUCG. The President or their designee shall serve as the official representative of UUCG at designated functions.
 - The **Vice President** shall serve as presiding officer at all Board meetings and/or Legal Business Meetings in the absence of the President. Unless otherwise determined by the Board, the Vice President shall also serve as presiding officer of the Church Council.
 - The **Secretary** shall maintain the official minutes of all Board and Legal Business Meetings of UUCG. The Secretary shall ensure that all policy changes are captured and maintained in the UUCG Policy Manual and that the Policy Manual is accessible to members and staff. The Secretary will ensure than an Annual Report is created for each fiscal year and made available at the congregational meeting that takes place in the spring.
 - The **Treasurer** shall ensure the financial records of the congregation are properly and accurately maintained. The Board shall obtain insurance to cover the activities of the Treasurer or ensure that the Treasurer is bonded.
 - The Treasurer-elect shall work with the Treasurer in preparation for assuming the full duties of the office when they take the position of Treasurer. The Board shall obtain insurance to cover the activities of the Treasurer-elect or ensure that the Treasurer-elect is bonded.
 - Members of the Board are expected to attend all regularly scheduled Board meetings. Should any member miss three consecutive meetings, they may, at the Board's discretion, forfeit their office.
- Section 6.3.8 Board Member Term of Office. The President, Vice-President, and Secretary shall serve for a term of one (1) year, while the Treasurer-elect/Treasurer shall serve for a term of two (2) years (the first year as Treasurer-elect), terms to be served July 1st through June 30th or until their successors are elected and qualified. A Treasurer-elect shall be elected each year to ensure staggered terms. At-Large Trustees shall serve staggered three (3) year terms. Members of the Board shall serve no more than two (2) consecutive terms in the same position. The Treasurer-elect/Treasurer shall serve no more than one (1) two-year term.

Article XI. Other Legal, Insurance, and Financial Provisions

Section 11.2 Bonding. The President, Treasurer, *Treasurer-Elect,* Secretary, and other authorized signatories may be bonded at the expense of UUCG in an amount determined by the Board.

Motion 2 Language

Article VI. Organizational Structure

Section 6.4.1 Leadership Development Committee Nominating Committee shall consist of five (5) members, elected by the membership at the Spring congregational meeting from a slate of Voting Members. Terms shall be for two years, with three members and two members elected in alternating years. **Members of the Nominating Committee shall be members in good standing of UUCG for a minimum of 6 months prior to their nomination.** Members may serve up to two consecutive terms.

The **Nominating Committee** Leadership Development Committee is responsible for the identification, **and** recruitment, and training of persons to serve in UUCG elected leadership positions.

The Nominating Committee Leadership Development Committee shall be responsible for preparing a slate of candidates for elected positions and providing that slate to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees at least 21 days prior the date of the Congregational Meeting at which candidates will be elected. use during Board and other elections, and making that ballot available to the membership in accordance with the notice requirements described in Section 7.1.1.

Section 6.6 Vacancy. In case of a vacancy in an unexpired term, a candidate shall be recruited by the Leadership Development Committee Nominating Committee. Upon approval by the Board, the candidate shall begin serving the unexpired term.

Article VII. Legal Congregational Business Meetings

Section 7.4 Legal Business Meetings. There shall be at least two regularly scheduled congregational Legal Business Meetings per year, the Spring Meeting and the Winter Meeting.

The Spring Meeting shall be held each year on or between April 1st and May 31st and shall include as part of its agenda: 1) election of **Board** Trustees and Officers, **and Nominating Committee members** 2) annual report of the Board and staff 3) financial report and any other business as may properly come before the meeting.

The Winter meeting shall be held on or between October 15th and December 20th to adopt the budget for the fiscal year and any other business as may properly come before the meeting.

The time and place for these meetings are to be determined by the Board.

Article VIII. The Minister

Section 8.3 Ministerial Search. When authorized by the membership, a Ministerial Search Committee, composed of seven members representing diverse perspectives of gender, race, household composition, religious orientation, and skill sets, shall be selected by the **Nominating Committee** Leadership Development Committee and approved by the voting congregation at a Legal Business Meeting. UUCG members shall be eligible to be elected after two years of active engagement in the UUCG congregational life.

The Ministerial Search Committee shall follow the search process prescribed by the Unitarian Universalist Association. The committee or its designee shall negotiate an initial job description and employment contract with the candidate. Said documents shall be presented to the Board for review and approval prior to approval of a candidate by the membership.

Congregational News

Congregational Meeting Sunday, May 19

Our annual May meeting is our opportunity to review all that we have done over the course of this program year, elect new leaders to our Board of Trustees and our Leadership Development Committee, and engage in other business as the Board deems necessary. The Board deems it necessary to recognize many of our members who have made significant contributions to our shared ministry. Nine people have been selected to receive our new *Partners in Ministry* award during this meeting. Please come and cheer for them ... and you may even BE one of the recipients this year!

The Board continues to review our bylaws for areas that need clarity, redefining, or changes that better serve the smooth governance of the congregation. Two changes to our bylaws are on the ballot:

Motion 1: To update the UUCG Bylaws to create a Treasurer-elect position on the Board of Trustees. The Treasurer-elect would serve for two years, the first year as Treasurer-elect and the second year as Treasurer. The Treasurer-elect shall work with the Treasurer in preparation for assuming the full duties of the office when they take the position of Treasurer. A Treasurer-elect shall be elected each year to ensure staggered positions. The Treasurer-elect/Treasurer may only serve one (1) two-year term. This will bring the total number of voting members of the Board of Trustees to eight (8). Edited sections are 6.3.4, 6.3.5, 6.3.8, and 11.2. Precise language for this change is included on the previous page.

Motion 2: To update the UUCG Bylaws to change the Leadership Development Committee to a Nominating Committee. This change is more aligned with the current function of the LDC. This change also includes specific requirements for members of the committee to be members in good standing of the congregation for a minimum of 6 months and clarifies the timeline for delivering a slate of candidates to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees. Edited sections are 6.4.1, 6.6, 7.4, and 8.3. Precise language for this change is included on the previous page.

Members will also elect new leaders at this meeting. The Leadership Development Committee has worked diligently to bring a full slate for the congregation's vote. Here are the excellent nominees you will see on the Ballot:
