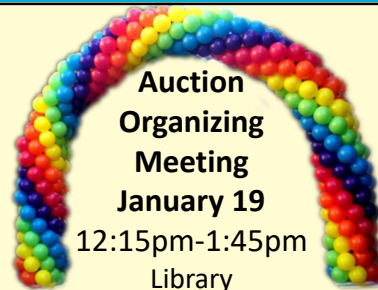

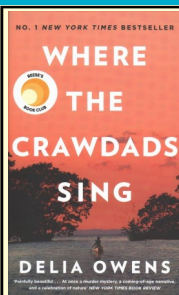

Give Away the Plate—Mosaic Georgia



Give Away the Plate is our community outreach program that chooses a non-profit every three months to donate half of our plate collection to. UUCG Members are encouraged to nominate nonprofits for consideration.

Our first quarter—January through March - Give-Away-The-Plate recipient is **Mosaic Georgia**, located in Duluth. Founded in 1986 as Gwinnett Rape Crisis, the organization titles itself *Sexual Assault Center and Children's Advocacy Center*. It serves men and women of all ages as well as children. They provide free, confidential support and services to victims and survivors of rape, sexual assault, and child sexual molestation and abuse. Services include a 24-hour crisis line, crisis intervention, legal advocacy, forensic medical exams (regardless of whether or not a victim wants to report to the police), education, and training.

Thanks to your generous donations, we raised \$720.66 for Habitat for Humanity.

Sunday Morning Faith Development Programs

It is our goal to provide you with inspiration and resources to help you live deeper into your UU faith on Sundays and throughout the week. Sunday, January 19 at 10:00am: We host discussions about various ways to get and stay involved in the movement to work toward social justice in our community, our nation, and the world. How can you put your faith into action and let your life speak? How can your compassion make a difference?

Sunday, January 26 at 10:00am: Faith Development presents a video and leads an engaging discussion, providing resources for further exploration.

Early Elementary at 11:15am, ages 5-7 years old: Our program strives not just to teach about Unitarian Universalism, but also to provide experiences around the strength of community, life issues we all share, and personal empowerment at an age-appropriate level. In a group setting, with loving adult guides, young children can engage in spiritual seeking, develop their openness to sharing, and experience the benefit of a supportive community. Children join their parents for the beginning of service and are dismissed around 11:15am for this program. Join us this month as we explore the concept of Belonging through our personal histories, the Story of the Universe, and the miraculous interconnection with all of life on earth.

Auction Organizing Meeting January 19



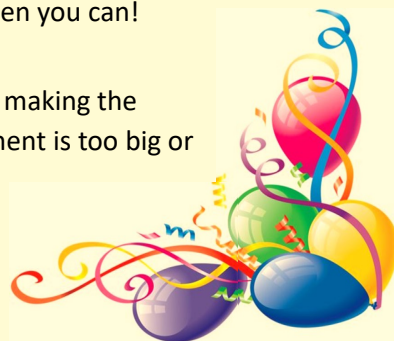
Would you like to help with one of the most exciting UUCG fundraisers of the year?

Following is information for transportation and Parking - Please plan accordingly to avoid unnecessary delays.

There will be NO VAN / AND OR BUS SERVICE in the morning. The service will be available from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM only. Please prioritize arrangements for transportation to the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center. The three locations available for parking are as follows:

Moore Middle School (LIMITED PARKING) -1221 Lawrenceville Highway (HWY 29). Most parking spaces are reserved for vendors and organizations with reserved parking passes only.

Several local businesses might allow parking.

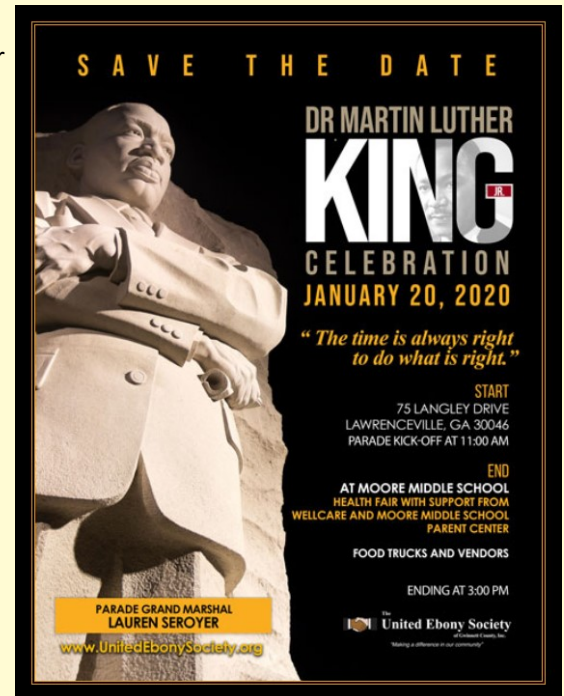
Limited Transportation will only be provided in the afternoon starting from Moore Middle School at 2:00 p.m to Central Gwinnett High School and First United Methodist Church of Lawrenceville.

The brief program begins at 11:00 a.m. and the parade line-up starts approximately 11:25 a.m. There is also a program with performances and vendors at Moore Middle School.

The UU group is usually at the end of the line up somewhere near the War Memorial. All parade walkers should plan to arrive no later than 11:00 a.m. Those persons that need to be dropped off; turn on to Langley Drive off of Lawrenceville Hwy 29, turn left on Constitution Blvd. Drive 100 yards and unload behind the War Memorial site at the Justice Center. Someone will be there to direct you to the main area.

Please remember this is a parade, not a march or protest.

Faith Speaks, Diversity Unites: a Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance Event

On January 11, 2020, from 7PM to 10PM, the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance is hosting a panel of faith leaders at the Madina Institute Atlanta Masjid. The Madina Masjid is located at 3580 Sweetwater Road, Duluth, Georgia 30096. The panel will feature faith leaders from Chinmaya Hindu Mission, Church of Latter-Day Saints, Community of Grace Lutheran Church, Guru Nanak Mission Society, Madina Institute Mosque, Saint John Neuman Catholic Church, Temple Beth David, and Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett (our very own Rev. Jan Taddeo is the faith leader representing us). These faith leaders will be answering questions that reveal their stories; reflecting how they live out their faith in their daily lives, evidencing the human experience of their lived faith. After the panel, attendees will be offered the opportunity to share their lived faith story with other attendees through answering the same questions with each other. All are welcome who are interested in Gwinnett faith diversity in uniting our community. Please register for this free event.

The Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance was formed after the Tree of Life Synagogue shooting in October 2018. Temple Beth David invited the community to attend their vigil and worship service. Their willingness to share their faith inspired other faith communities to join in work to foster inclusion and acceptance. Meeting monthly at different Gwinnett faith homes such as churches, congregations, mosques, synagogues, and temples, the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance works toward our mission. The Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance currently has Buddhist, Catholic, Hindu, Jewish, Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Lutheran, Muslim, Sikh and Unitarian Universalist faith representatives. I was so amazed by the welcome from the Temple Beth David community and invitation to grieve with them during their time of suffering. I had to join the endeavor to create an interfaith effort in Gwinnett County. We hope that other faith communities will join us in our mission.

The mission of the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance is to promote understanding and respect among the different faiths of Gwinnett County by interaction, communication and education. We will strive to create and enrich the community by working together to promote inclusion and acceptance. We will focus on our commonalities while embracing our differences. Steve Darnowsky of Temple Beth David describes his feelings, "As a member of Temple Beth David, I was very comforted by the outpouring of support after the Pittsburgh tragedy. I am very heartened by ongoing efforts to carry this community spirit forward to gather strength and unity from our diversity." This panel is our first event of what we hope to be an ongoing bi-annual panel exploring topics of how we live out our faith and the ways that diversity. We are also working on racial equity projects and other religious tolerance and acceptance projects as well as exploring ways to engage Gwinnett youths. The Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance is welcoming of everyone who agrees with our mission to join us. 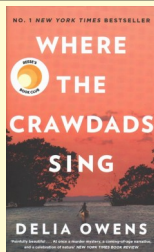
