Gadding About . . . From Reverend Jan Taddeo

Our theme for August is Perseverance. If ever there has been a need to hone our skills for persevering, this has to be it. I will be honest: this is hard. This being apart from our beloveds for so long, unable to hug our friends on Sunday morning, to enjoy casual, spontaneous conversations, offer ourselves in service to our precious gathering time, hang out together after the service to laugh, commiserate, hear one another's stories ... this is hard. It has been wearing on my soul, and I know it's wearing on many of yours. Yet, we persevere. We keep going, we don't yield to the despair. We keep showing up virtually. Though we are not able to gather regularly in person, we continue connecting through our weekly choir conversations, covenant groups, happy hour, chats with the minister, family faith development, and other virtual offerings.

If you are looking for more inspiration about this month's theme on Perseverance, I recommend Margaret Wheatley's book **Perseverance.** You can order a copy for yourself, or you can go to our UU Gwinnett YouTube channel and watch the readings from the book one day at a time. I have found this book to be especially inspiring and sustaining during this time of physical distancing and turmoil around the country, and around the globe. The weight of the world is heavy on my heart and perseverance feels like a critical quality to strengthen in my spirit during this time.

I have shared in previous posts and in worship services about the training I am undertaking under Meg Wheatley's leadership. Training as a Warrior for the Human Spirit requires a strong commitment to the spiritual practices of meditation, Qi Gong, direct perception, mindful domesticity, and connecting deeply with the life force and energy of the natural world. We are called upon to see the world as it is and discover the gentleness, decency and bravery that is available not only to ourselves, but to all human beings. Meg urges the Warriors to build "islands of sanity" in our local communities. When I described our congregation to her, she affirmed that we are indeed an island of sanity. We need to continue nurturing and growing this island to include more of Gwinnett County. I leave you with these words on bravery from Meg's book:

Never Too Late, by Margaret J. Wheatley

Bravery is a choice. It is a decision to enter into the fray no matter how illogical and crazy things are. Even as our friends, family and common sense recommend that we stay away. In our life, we are surrounded by people, events, circumstances that offer continuous proof of how bad things are, including bad people who don't seem worth struggling for. We did not plan to live in such a crazed world. Very few of us have been prepared by life circumstances to deal with the levels of fear, aggression and insanity we now encounter daily. When we were being trained to think, to plan, to lead, the world was portrayed as rational, predictable, logical. But now? Ever present insanity, illogic, instance, illusion. This is just the way it is and will continue to be. We can't restore sanity to the world, but we can still remain sane and available. We can still aspire to be of service wherever need summons us. We can still focus our energy on working for good people and good causes. It is never too late to be brave.

UUCG Members Participate in Event Calling for Removal of Local Confederate Memorial

The movement to remove Confederate memorials that has been sweeping through the nation and Georgia has arrived in Gwinnett County. On the afternoon of July 12th, about sixty Gwinnett residents gathered at the Gwinnett Historic Courthouse to call for the removal of the Confederate memorial there. The peaceful event, which was organized by the Alliance for Black Lives, also called on the Gwinnett School Board to implement curricula that honestly addresses racism and African American history.

The Confederate memorial at the courthouse is especially offensive because it is so recent and because of its location. The memorial was erected in 1993 following a racially charged 1990 MARTA expansion referendum. It is located at almost the exact spot where an African American man, Charles Hale, was lynched in 1911. A photograph of Mr. Hales brutalized body surrounded by a crowd of proudly posing white onlookers clearly shows that he was lynched near the intersection of Perry and Pike Streets, just a few yards from where the memorial was erected.

The event featured a number of speakers, including Georgia House Representatives Shelly Hutchinson and Gregg Kennard, Kirkland Carden, a candidate for the Gwinnett County Commission who helped initiate a petition drive to remove the memorial, Penny Poole of the Gwinnett NAACP, Everton Blair, Jr. of the Gwinnett School Board, Gwinnett District Attorney Danny Porter, Aaron Ragan of the Gwinnett County Historical Restoration and Preservation Board, historian and community activist Sara Patenaude of the Beacon Hill Black Alliance for Human Rights, Dr. Tarece Johnson and Norman Propst of the Alliance for Black Lives, our own Rev. Jan Taddeo, Samia Abdulle, an activist and community organizer who helped organize the event, and Steve Babb. Several of the speakers and people attending the event are members of the Gwinnett Remembrance Coalition, which

seeks to honor the memories of Gwinnett's victims of racial violence.

The event concluded with a prayer and a moment of silence led by Rev. Jan. While Rev. Jan spoke, Steve performed a brief, symbolic soil collection near the site where Mr. Hale was lynched.

A number of other UUCG members and alumni braved the pandemic to attend the event, including Peggy Averyt, Doug and Pat Beers, Bill Benshoof, Don Graff, Dinah Monk, and Thomas Yun.

Since this event, the pressure to remove this Confederate memorial has continued to build, with the Lawrenceville City Council and the Gwinnett Historical Restoration and Preservation Board requesting its removal, and a number of speakers at the public comment section of a Gwinnett County Commission meeting explaining why the memorial was offensive and calling on the Commissioners to do the right thing. The County Solicitor General, Brian Whiteside, has also filed a legal complaint asking that the memorial be relocated.



Give Away the Plate Donations— El Refugio



El Refugio provides critical support for detained asylum seekers and immigrants and their relatives. The organization is about a mile from the Stewart Detention Center, run for ICE by a private company, CoreCivic, in Lumpkin, GA. El Refugio's hospitality center provides free food and lodging for family members visiting their incarcerated loved ones. Reflections from the General Assembly

Rev. Jan Taddeo, Peggy Averyt, Terry Welsher, Christiana McQuain, and Sharon Yun were delegates at the GA Assembly this year. We will be sharing from our experiences over the next year. This month, Sharon Yun is sharing an excerpt of a lecture she found most profound. . Rev. Schuyler Vogel spoke about the evolution of the Universalist faith starting from when it first came to the U.S. Many things have changed over the years leading up to the Universalists' charge for being universally welcoming and active in social justice. His lecture also included a vision for the future of the Universalist faith. He shared about how his congregation unanimously voted to be a Sanctuary and adopted an immigrant family. His message is one of bold action and accountability as we put our principles and beliefs into action.

The John Murray Distinguished Lecture: Individual Salvation / Collective Liberation By Rev. Schuyler Vogel

"Our congregation's commitment to justice unequivocally has not only brought unity, but also growth, learning to be unapologetic and uncompromising has led to increase diversity and institutional health... Universalism and collectivism are two words that have a lot in common. They suggest solidarity and togetherness of purpose. They suggest action rather than passive reception. They do not pretend that we are the same or should be the same or should all be Universalist together and that makes us feel good or that we can be all things to all people. Most importantly, universal liberation would not sacrifice justice for false unity or fear of hurt feelings. It uses justice to build real unity, which means showing up for people who really are in need. . .

The world is too full of suffering, too full of hurt and pain, inequality and injustice for us as moral people, to not make [social justice] the center of what we do. We can be all spiritual and deep and profound, but if we know that there are kids trapped in cages and are dying, and we do nothing, we are nothing sort of complicit. If we praise ourselves as scholars or theologians or being above the political fray, but we know that Black and Brown Americans are being killed on the streets in terrifying rates, and we do nothing, we are heartless. If people can't get health care for their families, that's life and death for them. It's not politics. This universalism of the future doesn't make excuses for inaction or uncaring... Its universality comes from its universal care. It fights for everyone. It's concerned for everyone. It cares about everyone. Not about their cozy feelings of feeling okay and unpolitical.

This new Universalism refuses to center those who have always been in the center, catering to that. It's Universalist because it is less about us in our congregations, and more about who we serve, and care for. We need, and the Universalism of the future needs, to care enough to do something about it. To see justice as a spiritual practice, to take risks. Ministers need to be community organizers. Congregations need to be hubs of community activism.

For all the 250 years of American Universalism, we have seen our faith struggle with what love means. We've seen the power of knowing that God loves us, about the imperative that we should love just as deeply, about how that love includes everyone and everything on this planet no matter what. But now Universalism today must go deeper into a world we understand that Love is not simply a feeling, not simply the act of welcoming people into our space, but as a motivator for universal liberation and radical social change....

I don't want anyone to feel dehumanized or feel like they live in a society that doesn't care about them. And I don't want anyone to see a faith that calls itself Universalist pretending simply that it's Universalist because we say over and over again that all are welcome in our buildings. There is far too much suffering in this world to play it that safe. The universalism of the future needs to teach us that unless we are challenging the status quo, unless we know the status quo is a crisis, we are failing the legacy we've inherited. We are failing our fellow human beings.

This is not a moment to be above the fray, to worry about offending people who prefer moderation to real action. We can't care about feeling cozy. We can't sacrifice justice on behalf of those not yet ready or willing to join the fight. We must move beyond the goal of universal welcome in its shallowest form and move towards the goal of universal liberation. We have to believe that this is true to our faith's history. We have to believe that it is right for our moment now. And I pray now and I will keep praying that it will lead us forward to a better future. May it be so thank you, and amen."

Letter from the Board

Hello UUCG;

There has been a lot going on behind the scenes this month. First of all, and most importantly, we have been awarded our Paycheck Protection Program loan/ grant. This is a tremendous boon to the congregational finances, a shot in the arm worth \$25,000. A huge shout out to Treasurer Greg Bandy for keeping vigilant throughout this process. It was not an easy one. Thanks also to Terry Welsher and Rev. Jan Taddeo for assistance.

Secondly, there's been a lot going on in the building. Turning Sun School started construction on internal renovations. Two external doors have been added, and two internal walls have been removed. The nursery carpet was replaced, due to mold, and several bulletin boards were removed in the hall. Many of these changes were made in response to fire codes, and costs were incurred by the school. The bulletin boards are being sold for \$25 each. There are two remaining. They measure 40" x 54" with a two-inch black wooden frame. They are attractive and well-made. 
