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

Gadding About

Our October theme is Cultivating Relationship, a topic dear to my heart as I, like many other people, continue to learn how to cultivate rewarding and healthy

relationships with family, friends, and neighbors. I continue to learn how to be in a better relationship with myself, learning forgiveness, gentleness, and compassion for myself so I can offer these qualities more freely to others. I continue to explore and cultivate my relationship with the holy, which is a tall order for, as Peter Mayer captured so well in song, I see that "everything is holy now."

I also continue to cultivate my relationship with this not-so-easy faith called Unitarian Universalism. We have a complex history, steeped in colonization, various types of privilege, and gradually evolving over time to draw the circle of Unitarian Universalism wider. There are many ways a large institution can choose to do the work of cultivating relationship and reconciliation with those who for too long have been dismissed, discouraged, and dismayed by our failures to overcome many of the cultural aspects of our long and complex history. Having allowed the Unitarian Universalists of traditionally marginalized identities to take a leadership role in this effort gives me confidence that we are on a track that will bring us closer to creating a model of the Beloved Community within Unitarian Universalism.

Unitarian Universalism is a covenantal faith. Sacred promises hold us together, not just within a congregation, but between congregations. The language we have come to call our "seven principles" are not beliefs, but rather covenants - promises - for how our congregations are with one another, and how individuals can be in

community. Yet, these seven principles have seen little change since they were adopted in 1985. This is likely to change soon.

Per the bylaws of the UUA, an Article II Study Commission was appointed in 2019 to review the entirety of the 2nd Article in the UUA Bylaws. The charge to the Study Commission includes consideration of the many requests for changes to the guiding principles of our covenant of congregations that have been put forward over the years. You can learn more about all of this at the UUA website, and I encourage you to become educated on what is happening in our larger faith. You can find lots of information here.

Since I start my Sabbatical on November 1st, I will miss sharing with you the recommendations from the Article II Study Commission that will be presented to the UUA Board of Directors in January; our UUCG Board of Trustees will share their report with you when it becomes available. It will then be on the agenda for the 2022 General Assembly, and, if it passes, it will go through another year of discussion before being formally adopted in 2023.

I will return in March rested and renewed. You will be in very good hands while I'm away, and I'm already curious about what will be different and what will be the same when I return. I know I will be a little different for having the time to read, write, and learn more about the art of ministry; and, I expect you all to continue to grow, create, learn, and give towards realizing our bold vision of radical welcome, green space, spiritual growth, and connecting within and beyond our congregation. Please take very good care of each other while I'm away... you are each so precious and I love you dearly.

Navigating the Calendar

For now, our building remains closed for events. In anticipation of our eventual reopening all events added to the online calendar are being tagged with either 'online' or 'onsite' to make it easier to find an in person event or an online event, as you prefer.

On the calendar, found <u>here</u> on our website, there are two drop down menus just above the days of the week. One of them is 'event tags'. If you click it, a menu will drop down with lots of tags for various events including 'online' and 'onsite'.

Clicking on one of these will show a calendar view with only the events with the tag you chose.

At the bottom of the weekly enews each event has either a * or + next to it.

- * indicates the event is onsite
- + indicates the event is online

If an event has both symbols, it is offered with both an onsite and an online option.

Take a moment to familiarize yourself with these systems so that when we are able to reconvene, you will know how to look for the type of event you want.

From the Board

This month, UUCG will partner with Gwinnett County Public Library and the Human Library organization to bring a Human Library event to Gwinnett. This is a project I've wanted to organize for many years. As a retired public librarian, I first heard of it in professional library literature. The program comes from Denmark, where so many progressive ideas originate. Throughout the 20+ years I spent as a public librarian, I was routinely surprised by the commonalities between Unitarian Universalism and the public library world. At library conventions, I've participated in workshops on race, gender fluidity, welcoming and serving ALL of the public. From the Public Library Association website "PLA advocates for equity, diversity, inclusion and social justice in order to enable every member, library, and community group to fully and equally participate in a society mutually shaped to meet their needs." Could have been written by a Unitarian, yes?

What a pleasure it has been to work in a field that aligned with my principles. Every day of work was a day of service. Does your work (whether for pay or not) align with who you are? Or, at the very least, does it not conflict with who you are? Those who teach, who parent, who serve can very easily answer yes to these questions. What about the rest of you?

In most endeavors, there are countless ways to promote your values every day. Showing kindnesses, advocating for the one who's left out, looking beneath what is said to discover what is meant and making that plain. Last Sunday morning, Bob Patrick quoted Mohammed Ali: "Impossible is just a big word thrown around by small men who find it easier to live in the world they have been given than to explore the power they have to change it."

Each Sunday, we close the service with these words: "We extinguish this flame, but not the light of truth, the warmth of community or the fire of commitment. These we carry in our hearts until we are together again." Bring the light of Unitarian Universalism with you and watch for the power of possibility.

Human Library

Unjudge someone. That is the slogan for an innovative diversity program called the "Human Library."

On **Saturday**, **October 9**, from 6:00-8:30 pm, the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett will partner with Gwinnett County Public Libraries and the Human Library organization to offer an opportunity for interviews with living "books," who come from unique life experiences.

Due to the current Covid climate, the event will take place online via Zoom.

Human Library "books" are people who have agreed to make themselves available for discussion about stigmatized experiences. Some of the books featured include such titles as "Living with Bipolar Disorder," "Fathering a Child as a Gay Man," "Being Muslim in a Predominantly Christian County," and "Living with Vision Loss." The Human Library project puts a face on the headlines, allowing participants to begin to understand the experience of those who've been identified as "other." All human "books" go through training to ensure a safe space is maintained. The program allows people who may otherwise never talk to one another to engage in conversation.

The evening will begin with a talk by Gwinnett County School Board member Dr. Johnson on "The Changing Face of Gwinnett County." Please join us by registering <u>here</u>.

GATP recipient 4th quarter 2021



A wide range of services is provided to homeless youngsters, such as temporary housing, food, clothing, case management, counseling, life skills training, job-readiness training, linkages to healthcare and mental healthcare, and recreational opportunities.





Book Group October Selection: I'm Still Here by Austin Channing Brown

"Austin Channing Brown's first encounter with a racialized America came at age seven, when she discovered her parents named her Austin to deceive future employers into thinking she was a white man. Growing up in majority-white schools and churches, Austin writes, "I had to learn what it means to love blackness," a journey that led to a lifetime spent navigating America's racial divide as a writer, speaker, and expert helping organizations practice genuine inclusion.



In a time when nearly every institution (schools, churches, universities, businesses) claims to value diversity in its mission statement, Austin writes in breathtaking detail about her journey to self-worth and the pitfalls that kill our attempts at racial justice. Her stories bear witness to the complexity of America's social fabric—from Black Cleveland neighborhoods to private schools in the middle-class suburbs, from prison walls to the boardrooms at majority-white organizations.

For readers who have engaged with America's legacy on race through the writing of Ta-Nehisi Coates and Michael Eric Dyson, I'm Still Here is an illuminating look at how white, middle-class, Evangelicalism has participated in an era of rising racial hostility, inviting the reader to confront apathy, recognize God's ongoing work in the world, and discover how blackness—if we let it—can save us all."
