This year, it was two days filled with connecting with other UU administrators, sharing and gathering new ideas, and self care practices. I am immensely grateful to this congregation for my Professional Development budget that allows me to be a part of this organization and learn how to do my job even better!





UUA General Assembly Report

UUA's General Assembly was held in Pittsburgh, June 21-25. UUCG was well represented by Rev. Jan (onsite), Christiana Fernandez-McQuain, Terry Welsher, Ed Miller, and me (we four attended remotely). Key outcomes:

- The Article II vote passed, with some amendments. Wording is not final the vote was simply to continue study and discussion of Article II of the UUA Bylaws for one more year. It will be voted on in final form at GA 24 (which will be 100% remote).
- The Business Resolution did not pass. This was a hotly debated and complex proposal to divest UU Common Endowment Fund investments from the fossil fuel industry. Tied to this divestment was a proposal to make reparations to Indigenous tribes and the descendants of enslaved Black and Brown people. Note: the UUA Trustees, President, CFO, and other UU leaders issued statements that supported the goals, but not the methods in the resolution. I expect more to come on this in the next year as well.
- Rev. Dr. Sofía Betancourt was elected UUA President for a six-year term. She is the first woman of color and openly queer person to be elected to the office.

A longer report will appear in the next issue of GNUUS; in an upcoming UUCG worship service we will reflect on our experiences in business meetings, workshops, and worship services (the music!). In addition, in the coming year the Board will host a Congregational Conversation or two on several UUA topics.







A Brief History Of Volunteering at UUCG

Once upon a time (1981) ten families gathered to start a UU group that would meet in Gwinnett County. They took turns volunteering to host the Sunday services in their homes until the group grew and needed more space. They moved to several rental properties. By 1989 the weekly chore of setting up and taking down everything, every Sunday, was done by volunteers. Donating hundreds of volunteer hours, fundraisers were held and enough donations were finally raised to construct a permanent home for the now named UU Congregation of Gwinnett. With a "CAN DO" attitude, from the fall of 1990 until March of 1991, 65 volunteers worked days, nights, and weekends to construct the interior of our little metal shell.

Over the years since then, people have volunteered to improve our property adding an entry portico, a kitchen, a deck, playgrounds, an outdoor worship area, and a memorial garden. As they did, new friendships and bonds were made (many sustained even after departing UUCG). In addition, volunteers have taught religious education, Coming of Age (COA), Junior and Senior High Youth groups, and Our Whole Lives (OWL) classes, conducted lay-led services, served as officers, sung in the choir, maintained the building and grounds, prepared hospitality in the kitchen, marched for justice, represented UUCG at General assembly, and served on countless committees. Many of the volunteers wore more hats than can be counted.

Today, as we enter another period of transition, we continue to count on volunteers. With leadership from the Board we will move forward into our unknown future. For the congregation to thrive, continue to grow, and to serve (not only our current membership, but) the vast number of people in Gwinnett who need to find and grow with us, we ask our members for three things (the 3 T's) Time, Talent and Treasure. The pledge drive focuses on the treasure part, but today, I'm asking you to think about your time and talents and what you can do as a VOLUNTEER. Bonding together we can maintain a strong, vital UU community for years to come.

We've decided to simplify and just collect for the Lawrenceville Food Bank at this time.


