

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


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

But there's a new concept
entering the business world;
DEIB, or Diversity, Equity,
Inclusion, and Belonging.

about this from the pulpit
during a service in
September.)

No longer is it enough to have a black face on the staff page of your website and pay your female and non-binary employees as much as you pay the men, but the idea behind adding belonging is to consider the feelings of those 'diverse' employees. It's not enough to hire a queer Latina just for her to quit in a month because she wasn't welcomed in the office. Now that welcoming is becoming a more explicit part of companies trying (to varying degrees of success) to undue decades of white supremacy and other privileges.

Another small step on the path to dismantling systems of oppression.

Power, Privilege, and Justice -A Discussion Group on Resisting Racism

In November, I and (hopefully) some other folks will be developing guidelines and discussion questions for a series of discussions about power, privilege, justice, and resisting racism. Held on Tuesdays in December at 7pm via Zoom, these sessions will be centered around the book, "Mistakes and Miracles," co-authored by our new Contract Minister, Reverend Nancy Palmer Jones. The book was last year's UUA Common Read.

Because of the personal, interpersonal, and organizational challenges of resisting racism, there will be full transparency in this curriculum. The discussions will be covenantal, respecting and appreciating each person's story from their heart and from their head. "Mistakes and Miracles" is 399 pages, and the audio book is about 15 hours. Ten copies are being purchased by the Congregation, and they are available for loan (3 copies) or purchase (7 copies) at slightly a discounted price.

The first discussion will focus on pages 320 to 324, which are Reverend Nancy's thoughts at the beginning of her multicultural work with her previous congregation in San Jose, CA. We will try to put ourselves in her shoes, and share our reaction to her expressions of "self-conscious insecurity," her "dawning realizations about the many forms multiculturalism can take," her concerns about "the places where our ego tantalizes us," her statement that "There's so much more to cross-cultural understanding than just sharing a common language!", and her assertion that "Relationships, relationships, relationships' is the Common Thread that sustains me in the work's joys and sorrows." "Everybody's Talkin' 'Bout Food..."

Food events are a favorite in our congregation, but they require a lot of work behind the scenes. This is the typical list of considerations for food centered events:

Organizer- Sets dates and times. Reserves space with the administrator. Advertises the event. Handles ordering of pre-prepared or special items. I understand there is something called "decor" that is sometimes important.

Host- Recruits volunteers and does on-site coordination. CHECKS THE KITCHEN SUPPLIES before the event to back up our already-diligent supply chain. To request supplies, leave a note on the desk in the office.

Setup- Setting up tables and arranging chairs are a big task, though it can be made smaller with many strong backs.

Runners- Required both before and after the event unless the group likes enclosed spaces and wants to eat in the kitchen. (Runners to carry things from the kitchen to and from the serve-yourself area are VERY

helpful to folks like me who don't run much anymore.)

CLEAN UP- This gets special emphasis because bugs are a thing and STAFF DO NOT CLEAN UP AFTER US! Because our building is occupied during the week, this is a literal truth- for the safety of our young weekday visitors, leaving a mess of any kind behind FORCES staff to clean up.

Take-Down- Put the room(s) and/or Sanctuary back the way we found it, or, more exactly, the way our seating plan prescribes.

My personal opinion is, though it could be done with less, if we rotate through a team of at least three people (including Organizer and Host) we will not leave folks alone in a role, and we will all feel more sustained and fulfilled. Those of us who do not REQUIRE the supervision of other adults, but DESIRE company probably understand this. My personal (e.g. sexist) memory of this arrangement is my Dad's two older sisters and my Grandmother having great conversation after meals while washing, drying, and putting away the dishes



Trunk or Treat Success




