
The Gift of Pluralism

While pluralism is sometimes used as a synonym for diversity, even in a thesaurus, significant distinctions exist between the two terms. Diversity is the fact of multiculturalism, while pluralism is about engagement. Pluralism invites us to explore diversity and discover the ways in which we are enriched by it and recognizes diversity as an essential and integral part of the whole.

In our theology, pluralism is active and, therefore, demands curiosity, but it does not seek to change anyone. Because pluralism is about seeking and achieving mutual understanding, it does not require agreement. Pluralism doesn't ask us to merely tolerate differences; it impels us to build bridges across them. Relationship is primary.

Pluralism says, "Because we are in this together, let us make meaning of our togetherness."

Message from Reverend Nancy A Journey of Expansiveness: The Gift of Pluralism

When I first walk into a Unitarian Universalist sanctuary in February 1997, I can feel my heart expand, as though I'm breathing again after holding my breath for so long. What strike me first are:

(a) the music—The choir makes a glorious sound, and we sing a hymn I know from growing up Methodist, except with more inclusive words!

(b) the language—The liturgy features a flowing mixture of secular sources and sacred words I learned in childhood. The minister quotes a novelist I love, and then builds a sermon around zippers, something about the way they interweave separate sides in order to hold things together?

(c) the space—The sanctuary at All Souls in Manhattan is a huge vaulted place, with light streaming in through clear glass windows. There is room to breathe and to imagine something more than our struggling daily lives.

After that first love-struck experience, I gradually begin to understand what pluralism means in this religion, and how deeply rooted it is in our way of looking at life. Pluralism, as I hear it then, means welcoming in a great flood of wisdom from religious traditions around the world, as well as from science, personal experience, philosophy, and art. Wow! This search for meaning connects us all—I can feel it! I can hear it expressed and encouraged in this congregation!

It's really this pluralism—the recognition of many different paths, theologies, truths, and wisdom—that make me a deeply committed Unitarian Universalist. My UU journey helps me reconnect with some sacred language and ideas that have deep meaning now that I can encounter them, both personally and in community, without any prescription or constriction about what rings true in my deepest self. And I learn new ways of being, thinking, feeling, doing through the interchange—at school and in church—with so many different ways of making meaning. Muslim, Buddhist, Jewish, Christian, Hindu, Pagan, Humanist, and more—these paths begin to weave a beautiful new map for my soul.

This month, as we here at UUCG explore the Gift of Pluralism as one of the Values proposed for the Article II revisions in our Unitarian Universalist Association by-laws—where we name who we are—my understanding of pluralism expands again. It's not just about this cornucopia of religious offerings we embrace. It's also about embracing other kinds of difference—our neurospiciness, our personalities, our gender and sexual identities and all the other identities we claim as most true to who we are, even our political affiliations and the multitude of languages we speak.

If we cherish our own internal Universe—"we contain multitudes," as Walt Whitman said—can we also cherish the Universe inside everyone else? What boundaries do we need to set, so cherishing this difference does not condone behavior that harms the most vulnerable among us?

At the beginning of April, during our Flower Ceremony, those attending in person and online claimed the flower from the skit that we felt most like that day. As you can see from the pictures, we had many more Violets—shy and kind—than Dandys—big and brash—that day. Here at UUCG, there's room to breathe for all of us. And there's room to spare so that on this journey, we all continue to expand.

Healthy ValUUes

Message from the Board What does a financially healthy congregation look like to you?

The April Congregational Conversation revisited this Open Question with a discussion of the financial well-being of UUCG. In addition to a presentation of how our congregation raises and spends money, we engaged in activities designed to help us contextualize what our giving and receiving means to our mission at UUCG: "We strive to be a radically welcoming sanctuary in a green space. We foster spiritual growth as we joyfully nurture connections and community within our walls and beyond."

We included resources from the UUA program "The Wi\$dom Path," which is being scheduled as a full program presentation in the next program year. We performed an exercise in which we identified "Names for Money." It was enlightening to see how we use language that reflects our feelings about money, and how that may influence our perception of financial health. We identified a lot of words that relate to sustenance: lettuce, butter, bacon, dough, salt, cheddar, sugar. We found that some of us have phrases that inflect a negative connotation: filthy lucre, loot, bones, scratch, dead presidents, greased palms. We also discovered that sometimes the use of certain words makes us feel better about the role of money in our lives and our faith: tithes, shells, emolument, wealth, pledge, stewardship.

A review of our annual budget and current pledge drive provided us insight into how we apply our resources, and how we can continue to grow as a community. Our Bylaws require of membership "a commitment of time, talent or treasure to UUCG." We all bring gifts in unique ways, and that is our greatest strength. We ask that each member of our congregation look earnestly at what they can financially give without sacrificing their safety or personal well-being.

Our final activity was a fun exploration of what we value most. Each attendee was given three "dollars," and we provided baskets for different areas of expenditures that the Board has received requests to fund outside of our essential operational costs. Here is what we found that UUCG members value most:



Building Bridges by Bill Benshoof (he/him)

As a teen, my Sister (now a Clinical Psychologist) had a poster on her wall:

"People are Lonely Because They Build Walls Instead of Bridges."

I think of the wisdom of that poster when I hear this great lyrical excerpt from a hymn by Brian Wren:

Love makes a bridge from heart to heart, and hand to hand. Love finds a way when laws are blind, and freedom banned. Love breaks the walls of language, gender, class, and age. Love gives us wings to slip the bars of every cage. Love lifts the hopes that force and fear have beaten down. Love breaks the chains and gives us strength to stand our ground.

As I grow and learn about life and love, my mentors speak to me about ways to love others that reach deep into our shared needs as humans. One such mentor, David Morgen, who recently was UUCG's Ministerial Intern for two years, summed it up when he described one of the greatest challenges to building those bridges of love- **PRESENCE**.

A key component of Radical Welcome is its focus on relationship-building. When folks muster the courage and curiosity to cross our threshold, a big part of my Commission is to meet them with compassion. Science tells us that, comparing DNA, we are 99.6 percent identical. And, as different as that small point-four percent of our DNA allows us to be, we are fundamentally drawn into connection, relationship, and interdependence.

To be fully present to another person's speech, story, and thoughts- to listen with such focus and intensity that understanding grows, trust is inspired, and we connect deeply with the hearts and minds of others- is an essential part of the "Discipline of Love" our proposed new UU Values & Covenant statement speaks of. It is also a key component of the "Radical Welcome" I am commissioned to invite everyone to practice.

This gift of listening and the empathy that grows along with it is key to living in peace with one another despite our wide range of thoughts, ideas, and interests. It is part of a practice the Einhorn Collaborative publication, "A Call to Connection," calls "bridging:"

"When we bridge, we see demographic change and our diverse identities as positive and enhancing who we are.

Bridging calls on us to engage in healthy dialogue and requires us to listen deeply. Bridging does not mean abandoning your identity.

Bridging means acknowledging our shared humanity, rejecting that there is a 'them,' and moving towards a future where there is instead a new 'us.'

For when we bridge, we not only open up to others, we also open up to change within ourselves – where we can participate in creating a society built on belonging."

Bridging is an opportunity to grow your circle of human concern, and to open yourself to the likelihood of finding real joy and fulfillment in relationships with those who are unlike you in fundamental ways. Mack McCarter, founder and coordinator of Community Renewal International in Shreveport, LA, puts it best:

"When I meet you, I assume there's a bridge from my heart to yours- and I am coming over!"

Bridging asks all of us to hold big differences and deep disagreements without dehumanizing the other person; never reducing them to a caricature or seeing them as less worthy of health and happiness than we are.

Those foundational needs can be the starting point to ensuring common dignity—recognizing that another person or group has their own human drives, tastes, values, goals, and worldview, just like we do.

As Chimamanda Adichie emphasizes in her TED Talk, "The Danger of a Single Story," we must learn to question the single story we may tell ourselves about others, and to consider how every human holds a complex narrative of joys and pains, gains and losses, privilege and poverty.

Crucially, bridging work is not about erasing differences or persuading someone to change their mind or identity, but is instead about increasing our own understanding. This requires asking questions, suspending judgment, and committing to the bridging relationship over time—not just making a one-time gesture. One way to do that is by continually seeking shared identities above and beyond those which divide us.

To be clear, bridging does not guarantee the comfort of common ground or compromise. It asks each of us to seek authenticity and mutuality while taking into account potential disparities in power. As explained by Rev. Jennifer Bailey, "Social change happens at the speed of relationships. And relationships move at the speed of trust."

Over time, bridging asks us to be willing to let go of our perceptions and preconceived ideas of who people are and why they act in certain ways, replacing these with a true portrait of the other's humanity. As challenging as it can be, the personal and societal benefits of bridging are profound. Whether connecting across age, race, nationality, religion, ideology, or something else, learning how to positively relate to someone perceived as an "other" contributes to less stress, better personal health, and a stronger social fabric.

I believe that our UU values uniquely position us to be a unifying force in a world that is less centered on the "traditional Church" than ever before. For me, being about that work, particularly with those folks who are seeking the beloved community we are building, is a naturally energizing and motivating practice. I invite everyone to join me!





Georgia Elections

All of our congressional representatives and state house representatives and senators are up for reelection this year and most have primary opposition. A crucial part of the May primary is that the nonpartisan judicial elections, including those for the Georgia Supreme Court, are held during on the primary date in even numbered years, and NOT during the November election. Early voting has already begun.

Only a few of the judicial elections are contested (including one Georgia Supreme Court Justice), meaning all others are uncontested. So, **please do your research and make sure your voice is heard in the contested judicial elections**.
