




# Message From the Minister



### What a Year It Has Been

In the life of a Unitarian Universalist congregation—and of the minister who serves it—the month

of June is the culmination of a yearlong journey that begins anew in late August. As part of our covenant with each other, we travel together through a year of living and loving, learning and growing, grieving and celebrating, accompanying and making meaning with all that Life brings us. We keep figuring out how to Create a Culture of Care, this year's explicit theme.

And what a year this has been! We have welcomed new life and new members. We have said goodbye to beloved members and friends. We have tried on new roles and activities, and we have relished traditions that continue to nurture us.

We have lived through, and are living through, a turbulent and sometimes terrifying time in the face of government actions and policies that betray our core values and threaten some of us with physical, psychological, emotional, and spiritual harm. We have responded, and are responding, with curiosity, courage, and compassion as we continue to discern what is ours to do, as a community and as individuals, and as we do what we can and what we must.

Through it all, we have stayed together, always learning to live with Love at the center of all we say and do.

When I look back at the sweep of themes our Soul Matters collective has offered us this year, I see two major stages in our journey:

From September through December, the practices we've explored—invitation, deep listening, repair, and presence—are all about the process of **opening** 

**our hearts and minds**. These practices ask us to break open our hearts and stretch wide our minds so that they can hold new experiences, new voices, new perspectives, new thoughts and feelings. When you think back on this year, how have your mind and heart grown?

And from January through May, the practices of story, inclusion, trust, joy, and imagination have asked us to **envision just what kind of community we are promising to create**. How much inclusion, trust, joy, and imagination does the story we are writing together contain?

And now we move into this culminating month, exploring the **practice of freedom**. I can already feel my heart breaking and my mind opening as we focus on this theme and travel across the threshold into this month of June. Don't we need every single one of the practices we've explored this year—invitation, deep listening, repair, presence, inclusion, trust, joy, and imagination—to create a real and lasting freedom for all? How will we learn and grow, grieve and celebrate, accompany each other and make meaning in these precious weeks to come?

Let's find out!

I love you and am grateful that we are on this journey together!

## Practicing Freedom...

### Will You Join a Listening Circle on a Tough, Tragic Issue?

an invitation from Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones

At the Unitarian Universalist Association's online General Assembly in 2024, a majority of delegates voted for an Action of Immediate Witness (AIW) titled "Solidarity with Palestinians." This AIW begins by affirming our faith's commitment to the safety of Jewish people and decrying the violence enacted by Hamas on October 7, 2023. Then the AIW focuses on the devastating harm and tragic losses experienced by Palestinians through the ongoing war in Gaza. It calls on UU congregations to take one or more of these actions—witnessing; educating; organizing and advocating—with specific requests listed for each.

Also last year, a majority of delegates voted for a Responsive Resolution expressing "UUA General Assembly Support for October 7 Hostages," seeking to balance the focus on losses on both sides of this conflict.

Increasingly, as your minister and as a human being, I feel a pressing moral responsibility to help UUCG engage with this tragic and traumatic issue. Will you join me later this summer for a Listening Circle centered in Love that would make space for our thoughts and feelings about this devastating war, and open a path to considering whether and how we might respond to the AIW? (This war is only one of many in that very region, but it is the one most supported by United States funds and ammunition.)

How do we as a congregation live into our shared UU values in our daily lives in the larger world?

Interdependence

The May Congregational Conversation focused on an Open Question that explores our relationship with the community around us. As we face these challenging times in our society, we must ask ourselves: **How do we engage in the broader world that protects, even celebrates, the core values that we uplift as Unitarian Universalists?** 

Our Conversation took place in small groups as we pondered the Values Flower and asked ourselves:

What are we doing currently?

• What have we done in the past that we want to uplift?

• What can we do in the future?

Below is a sampling of the answers from these groups. This is, by no means an exhaustive list. It is not intended to be. The purpose of this exercise is to show how we are making a difference, and to inspire ourselves to continue to make a difference.

Currently, we exemplify JUSTICE by providing notaries for immigrants with Familias Juntas, supporting families through El Refugio, and practicing Good Trouble. We seek EQUITY through our Trans Inclusion Workshop and the GA Legislative Network. We support TRANSFORMATION by supporting CUUPS, working with the Interfaith Alliance, and attending Pride Events. We encourage PLURALITY by hosting the Peace Festival, supporting Tarot and Meditation groups, and holding Alphabet SoUUp, QUUest,

Trunk or Treat, and other events. We encourage INTERDEPENDENCE through the Climate Justice Revival and Green Team Film Screenings. We celebrate GENEROSITY through the collections for the Lawrenceville Food Co-Op, Corley Elementary backpacks, and the Give Away the Plate program.

And always with LOVE at the center.

We have done some things in the past that may inform us in our development

of ideas. These include the practice of Greet Your
Neighbors; inviting other faith traditions to "swap" a service;
Coming of Age/OWL
programs; the Gwinnett
Remembrance Coalition;
marching in the Atlanta Pride
Parade; participating in the
MLK Day Parade; and our
founding members providing this

As we think about what we "can do," our vision opens wide and far. We hope you will think about other ways we can live our values through community engagement!

building as a home for these values.

Some ideas that were presented during our Conversation included: a Trans Inclusion Seminar for the public; a Community Garden; obtaining a Certification for the property as a Pollinator or Wildlife Sanctuary; Music Performance opportunities; Skill-Sharing Workshops for the public; organized appearances at town halls, protests, or other public spaces; and more outreach to other religious affiliations and marginalized communities.

# From the Board Report on the Spring 2025 Congregational Meeting

On May 18th, UUCG held its annual Spring Congregational Business Meeting, at which the congregation voted on the following items:

#### **Resolution #1:**

Having witnessed David Morgen's ministry with UUCG as Intern Minister from 2021-2023, and acknowledging the breadth and depth of his preparation for the ministry as represented by the award of his Master of Divinity degree and by his admission to ministerial fellowship by the Unitarian Universalist Association's Ministerial Fellowship Committee, we, the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett, vote to ordain David Morgen as a Unitarian Universalist minister and call him into loving ministerial service to our faith.

Resolution #1 passed with 94.6% of the Congregational Vote, which included 3 abstentions and 0 Nays

# Radical Welcome and the Power of Freedom by Carol Underwood, Lay Minister for Radical Welcome

In our beloved community, we have the call to love boldly and welcome radically. We show up again and again to hold sacred space for others. We greet the

weary, the marginalized, and the hopeful with open arms. This is the great work of freedom to live love as a liberating force. Yet, even love, when poured without rest, can leave us empty.

Living love in the practice of freedom asks that we embody justice in how we show up. This is not only for others, but also for ourselves. As helpers, we often forget this second part. We extend grace outward without drinking from the well ourselves.

Burnout is not a failure. It is the body's wisdom whispering, or even sometimes shouting. The spirit needs care. Helpers often internalize the myth that exhaustion is proof of commitment. But there is no freedom in that! When we overextend, we lose the ability to respond with joy. We may grow resentful, cynical, or numb. When we find ourselves approaching that point, it can be helpful to think of these feelings as an invitation to take a breath and return to our center.

Remember to ask yourself, am I loving myself with the same radical welcome I offer others?

Radical welcome is not a one-time gesture. It is a daily, deliberate choice to live love as freedom. When we live this way, we model a justice that is welcoming and a hospitality that transforms. Remember, the beloved community includes us too.

So may we continue in this love not endlessly, but sustainably to build a world where all are free, all are held, and all are home.

We are a group of peers within UUCG who gather once a month (on the first Monday evening), sharing a potluck meal, fellowship, and an LGBTQ+ community-related topic for discussion.

I personally have enjoyed getting to know my peers of our community within UUCG, and I am learning a lot about our culture and history along the way. I feel safe with my peers enough to share my coming out story, and my emotional struggles in the years since coming out as a lesbian.



Alphabet SoUUp is open to anyone age 18+ who identifies as LGBTQ+ (queer or questioning). We meet at UUCG and online via Zoom on the first Monday of every month from 6:30-9:00 pm. # The DIY Nature of Pride by Aline Harris

In 1978, a few months before June, 30 people joined together to make from scratch something that had not existed before. They took over 1,000 yards of white cotton, huge trash cans full of dye, and a laundromat down the street and they created the first gay pride flag.

In 1981 the marketing team for a multinational corporation that would later sell for \$8.9 billion bought an ad in The Advocate (an LGBT publication).

Corporations have been trying to co-opt the community and DIY spirit of the queer community for at least that long.

But the community has been creating the world we want to exist in since before then.

More recently, in 2023, a popular chain store caved to bigoted pressure to remove their Pride collection, revealing that the company never cared about supporting the queer community or celebrating gay pride, only taking our dollars.

This year for pride let's return to the DIY spirit we started with.

So many things exist in all the colors of the rainbow. Do you know all the amazing things you can make out of duct tape? Out of beads, yarn, markers, LEGO bricks?

Don't have a particular skill? Trade with friends, learn something new, or support a queer artist. This year, let's think outside the box store when shopping for Pride gear.






### **Green Sanctuary 2030:**

### Good Trouble: Climate Justice

### UUCG will be involved with Climate Justice and Voting all Summer.

On April 27<sup>th</sup> and May 17<sup>th</sup> UUCG participated with UUs from across Georgia, the UU GA Legislative Action Network (UUGALAN), and Side with

UUCG members and friends attended the Public Service Commission (PSC) meeting to make verbal public comment on the Georgia Power Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) on March 28<sup>th</sup> – look for a report on this next month.

### Get involved. Important dates this summer:

### June 17<sup>th</sup>

Vote in the PSC Primaries. Don't let the District Commissioner concept fool you. These primaries and the election for the District Commission Seats are voted on by everyone in the state of Georgia. Let others know about this important primary.

Plan to vote November 4<sup>th</sup>.

### June 23<sup>rd</sup>

Save the Date - Rally at the Public Service Commission offices downtown with the UUGALAN and Side with Love.

This is the beginning of the Rebuttal period on Georgia Power's IRP.

As of this writing – UUGALAN is still awaiting the analysis of the recent announcement that there will be no rate case hearings this summer. This does not mean that your costs will remain the same; Hurricane Helene and other storm related damage costs are still being assessed by Georgia Power. These costs are anticipated to be submitted to the PSC in 2026 for approval.

# Becoming Who We're Meant to Be

As a child, I believed freedom meant no rules. I longed for it in the way many children and teens do—aching for space, voice, autonomy. But my yearning came with extra weight. My father was deeply controlling and emotionally oppressive, and I felt like my spirit had been carefully folded down into something small, something silent. When he passed away, I experienced a strange and shocking release. There was grief, yes—but also something electric. I was free in a way I had never been before. And it was both invigorating and terrifying.

In the face of that fear, I rushed to something familiar and safe—I married my high school sweetheart, thinking that maybe love could be the container for all this uncharted space. But for ten years, I played a role I didn't recognize. I looked in the mirror and saw someone shaped by obligation and the old voices still echoing in my head. That kind of false safety doesn't hold for long.

When I divorced, it was like the veil lifted again. I

began the slow, sacred work of weeding through years of internalized shame, fear, and silence. I reached back to find the joyful, vibrant me I had lost —and this time, I didn't do it alone. I connected with people who saw me clearly. I volunteered with nonprofits that aligned with my values. I found myself in community, in service, in spiritual grounding. My wellbeing became a priority, and through that care, I started to bloom again.

This is the heart of Connecting Beyond—not just reaching out to others, but returning to ourselves through relationship, through purpose, through love freely given and freely received. Practicing freedom through love doesn't mean living without boundaries—it means choosing the ones that honor who we are. It means remembering that we are not here to shrink, but to live fully, connected, and true. In freedom, we remember who we are—and in connection, we become who we are meant to be.



Each summer the Lawrenceville CoOp partners with Village of Hope to make sure that students in our area who are in need of food get the support they require. They are starting to collect food for this program and could use our help.
