The Seventh Generation Principle

The Seventh Generation Principle is a philosophy deeply rooted in Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) culture that emphasizes considering the long-term impact of present-day decisions on the well-being of future generations. It dictates that leaders should contemplate the consequences of their actions for the next seven generations. This principle promotes sustainability, stewardship, and responsible decision-making for the benefit of those who will come after us.

Derived from the Great Law of Peace, the founding document of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy, it is a guiding principle for the Haudenosaunee, shaping their governance, decision-making, and way of life. The principle has gained wider recognition and is now being applied to various contemporary issues, including environmentalism, business practices, and social justice.

UU Values

As Unitarian Universalists, we draw from our heritages of freedom, reason, hope, and courage, building six values with Love at the center. Inseparable from one another, these shared values are:

Interdependence: We honor the interdependent web of all existence.

Pluralism: We celebrate that we are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology.

Justice: We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive.

Transformation: We adapt to the changing world.

Generosity: We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.

Equity: We declare that every person is inherently worthy and has the right to flourish with dignity, love, and compassion.



Fun Sustainability Activities

Upcycling Crafts: Gather materials such as cardboard, old newspapers, bottles, or jars, and turn them into new, useful items like pencil holders, bird feeders, or planters.

Sustainable Fashion Show: Create clothing or accessories using recycled materials. Organize a "fashion show" where they can showcase their designs and explain their choices.

Solar Oven Cooking: Construct simple solar ovens using cardboard, aluminum foil, and plastic wrap. Solar energy can be harnessed for cooking by using the oven to bake simple items like s'mores or heating up snacks.

Seed Bombs: Create seed bombs by mixing clay, soil, and wildflower seeds into small balls. Throwing these seed bombs in specific areas can help reseed barren or neglected spaces, contributing to biodiversity and supporting local ecosystems.

Bee Habitat Creation: Create bee-friendly habitats by constructing bee hotels using recycled materials like bamboo, cardboard, or small logs. Additionally, plant native flowers and herbs that attract bees to provide them with food sources.
