A Brief History of Pride

The first Pride parade was held on June 28, 1970. It went from Greenwich Village in NY to Central Park, which is 51 blocks. Between 3 and 5 thousand people turned out. Ever since, Pride Month has been celebrated in June.

The term Pride was coined in 1970 by activist Craig Schoonmaker, who in a 2015 interview said “There’s very little chance for people in the world to have power... But anyone can have pride in themselves, and that would make them happier as people, and produce the movement likely to produce change.”

Why do we celebrate Pride? Because we still live in a country where queer people are shamed for being who they are. It is a public example that self-love and community acceptance are powerful bridges toward liberation. - excerpt from “Pride Month: A History of Resistance” on thetaskforce.org
