In Her Own Words.

One of my favorite things during seminary was the pulpit supply I did to earn a little extra cash. I traveled up and down the Prairie Star District (now part of the MidAmerica Region) visiting Unitarian Universalist congregations: small, medium and even a few large; layled and minister-led. All told, I have led worship in about 40 congregations in over 10 states.

Many times, after the service, some subset of the congregation and I would sit down to lunch together. I would engage them in conversation around what it was like to embody Unitarian Universalism in their town. What were their challenges? What were their successes? As I listened to them, I grew a deep appreciation for how our faith is incarnated in different locales. And I fell in love with almost all of the congregations I visited.

[...] Over the past few years, I have felt my vocation shifting. The religious landscape has changed in this country. Attendance at church is down, giving is down in many congregations, and it is often difficult to find volunteers. There is a saying that congregations are still ideally structured for church life in the 1950s, but this reality is long gone. One question now drives me: how do our Unitarian Universalist congregations continue to best embody our faith and adapt to these changes?
